State Fire Marshal Believes Gage's Lake Fires Are Incendiary

Deputy State Fire Marshal James Johnson announced last week that the fires which destroyed a farm home near Gage's Lake, owned by Dr. S. L. Keller, and the old Grange Hall schoolhouse one mile distant last week, were of incendiary origin.

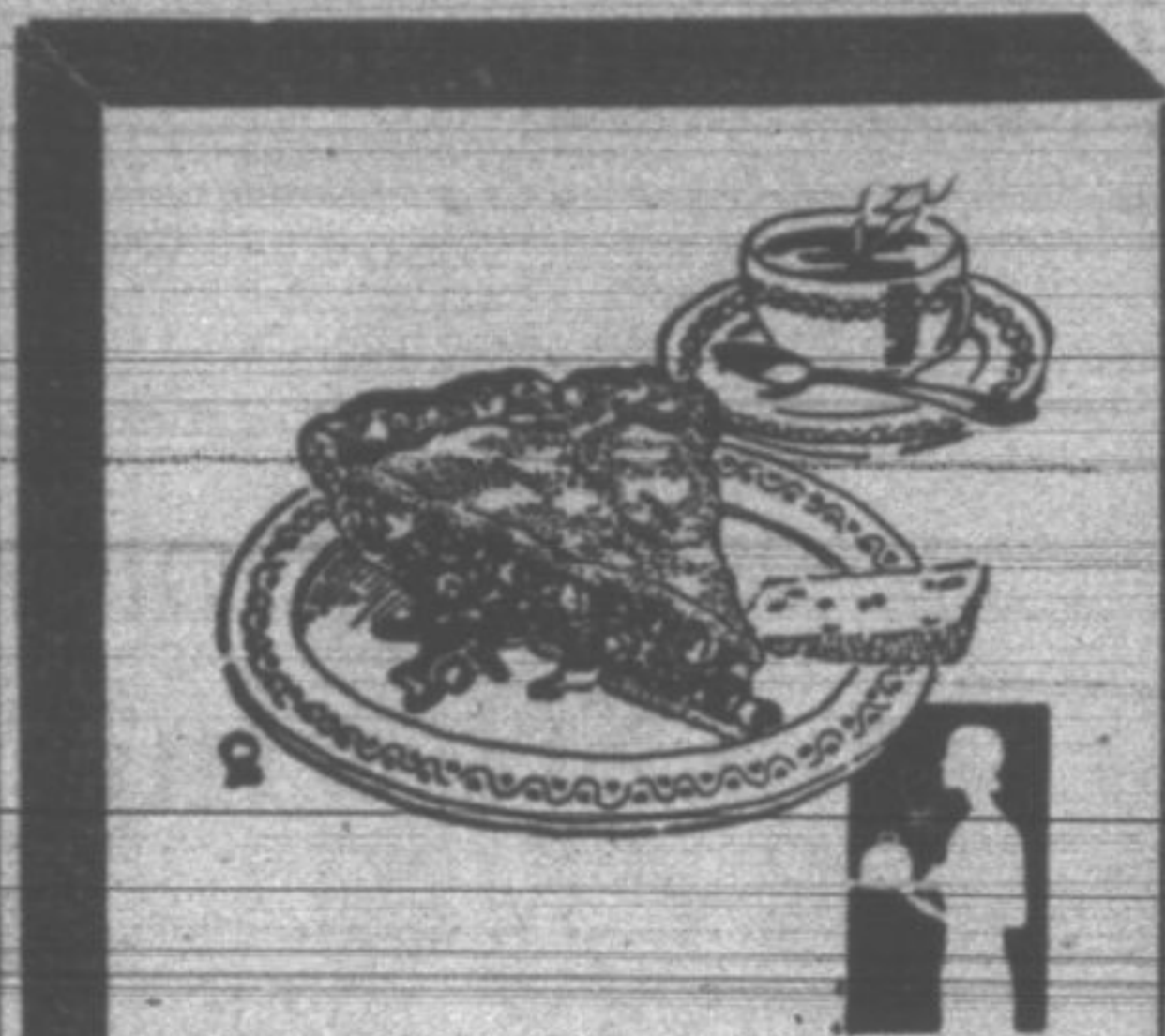
Johnson has been investigating the fires for several days.

Since the two buildings were entirely destroyed, it is unlikely that clues which would lead to the arrest of the firebug will be obtainable, Johnson said.
