WHO ARE THE GIRL SCOUTS? Girl Scouting is essentially a game for many girls to play together. It is a game whose playing takes from the time we are children until we are grown up, and one of the reasons for inventing it was to provide a means for numbers of girls to work and play together during these years. Thus it will have become quite habitual for them to work and play together when they are full-fledged citizens, so that they not only can accomplish more good by friendly co-operation but they can have very much better times.

Happiness is the birthright of every child and good health contributes to happiness. Girl Scouting takes the girls out into the open, hikes with them, teaches them woodcraft, camping and swimming. It teaches them certain fundamental rules of hygiene, such as exercising in the open air, and cleanliness. The outdoor life brings with it more than health in the ordinary sense—it brings quiet, birds and stars increases.

WORKS, WAYS AND PLAYS The activities center around four interests

-Home, Health, Nature and Citizenship. These provide incentive for practicing woman's world old arts by requiring a working knowledge in cooking, housekeeping, first aid, and the rules of healthful living for any Girl Scout passing beyond Tenderfoot work. Of the forty-odd subjects for which merit badges are given, more than one-fourth are in subjects directly related to the services of woman Into this work, so often distasteful, is brought the sense of comradeship, effected partly by having much of the actual training done in groups. Another element is the pubic recognition and rewarding of skill in this woman's most elementary service to the world, isually taken for granted and ignored. The snirit of nlay put into the simplest and most

lisliked of household tasks banishes drudgery. Handicrafts of many sorts enter into the program of the Girl Scouts. In camping, firls must know how to set up tents, build ean-tos, and construct fireplaces. They must ilso know how to make knots of various sorts or use for bandages, tying parcels, hitching ind other purposes. Among the fields in which proficiency badges are awarded are susiness, handicrafts, home-making, homejursing, nature, outdoor skills, photography. Girl Scout leaders believe that both the labits formed and the information acquired n these activities contribute to preparing the firls to meet intelligently most of the situaions that are likely to arise in their later ife. This is expressed in the Girl Scouts' notto, "Be Prepared."

ORGANIZATION

Scout by passing the Tenderfoot Test and paying her annual dues of 50 cents to National Headquarters. The governing body is
the National Council, composed of representatives from local councils throughout the
country, and of other members elected by the
National Council. A National office is maintained to carry out the policies of the National Council and to supervise and encourage the growth and development of Girl Scout troops all over the country.

A local council may be organized in any community to promote and supervise the wel-fare of Girl Scouting in the district. The unit of organization among the girls

themselves is the patrol of eight members each. From one to four patrols form a troop, and both patrol and troops are grouped, whenever possible, according to the age and congeniality of the girls. Each patrol has a leader chosen from among its members and each troop has a captain or adult leader who is more or less trained in the leadership of girls. The captain may choose lieutenants to assist her. Troops may be formed in connection with any church, school, play-ground, settlement or other organization or they may be entirely unattached.

TROOP The Girl Scouts of Troop I met last Tuesday at the Oak Terrace School. They played games and sang songs. Then it was announced

that they would hold candy and bakery sales to raise money to send the girls to camp. The patrol leaders took charge of the signalling tests. Four groups were formed. Molly Kehrwald took the whole troop to her corner, including those who had all ready passed their signalling test. She then gave out a series of letters. Those girls who named the letters correctly went to Bernice Swan's group - the second group. Those who did not name them correctly stayed in Molly's corner until they knew them and then were sent to Bernice Swan. From Bernice Swan they went to Lena Callri's corner and from there to Marie Baracan's corner - thus passing the test. Then the captain gave out messages in the Morse code. The patrols studied the messages and hurried to carry out the instructions. Bernice Swan's patrol carried out the first message - get your captain a glass of water - first. Lena Callvi's patrol carried out - Sing your patrol song - message first. The meeting was then adjourned by the singing of the lullaby song Miss Swan taught the girls. -Troop I Scribe

## Do Not GAMBILE in 1931

Resolve in 1931 to understand your automobile policy better. Do you know whether you are insured in a Stock, Reciprocal, or Mutual Co.? How is your policy signed?

Do you know that certain policies do not protect you against the claims of persons that may be injured while riding in your car? Do you know that certain policies exclude the operation of cars by children under eighteen years of age unless accompanied by an adult member of the family?

Do you know that certain policies include the costs of defense in their liability limits thereby reducing your protecton? Do you know why reciprocals operate by an attorney in fact?

Do you know that when you insure in a reciprocal you give some stranger power of attorney?

Do you know that the power of attorney is so worded that in an emergency he can confess a judgment against you without your knowledge?

Do you know that the solvent members of a reciprocal may be held for and made to pay the entire losses of the reciprocal? While the fellow who has nothing pays nothing.

Do you know that in a reciprocal you are gambling all your assets with a lot of unknown partners?

Do you know that in a reciprocal if your car should burn or be stolen you cannot sue the reciprocal?

Do you know that over twenty-five hundred members of a reciprocal in Chicago, Ill. awoke one day to find judgments of record against them for over fifteen thousand dollars?

Do you know that a judgment of a record is a lien on your home? Do you know why reciprocal policies are signed by an attorney in fact?

Do you know that the policy holders are about the only ones to lose when the reciprocal goes smash?

Do you know that over 70% of all casualty insurance in the U.S. A. is carried in Stock Companies?

Do you know why in a reciprocal you are called a subscriber and not a policy holder?

Do you know why your premium is referred to as a deposit and not a premium? Do you know that stock companies do not ask you to sign an

application when you insure your car? Do you know that certain reciprocals promise you a yearly saving of about 20% but that if the Reciprocal should become involved financially the Court may order you to return the savings for four of five years. What is saving about that?

Do you know that in a reciprocal the policy holders lose and in a Stock Company the stock holders only lose?

Do you know that a little carelessness in settling a claim with a minor for personal injury may involve you in legal entaglements and cost you heavy damages when the minor reaches legal age?

Do you know that you are always liable for the unpaid claims of a Reciprocal Company for the years you were a member?

Where will the reciprocal be when you have reached retirement age?

Who will pay them? Will you have to bear your assessment and return to labor?

Will your home be taken to pay the claims of your partners? Can you conscientiously buy reciprocal insurance with entanglements?
