Worse yet, a sense of defeat, through lack of actual acocmplishment, is created in the pupils. Education is the basis of activity in adult life. Every child, therefore, in our complex civilization must be equipped with some skill,an art, a science, a craft, if he is to be saved from the human scrap-heap -the degration of the "bread-line." Ultimately deficient schooling is injurious both to individual and to the state.

The proposed bill for the larger school unit provides in substance "that within 90 days after the law goes into effect there shall be elected by popular vote a county board of education, consisting of five members, one each from five different districts within the county.
