## February Sales of A. & P. Stores Show Only Small Decrease

February sales of The Great At. lantic & Pacific Tea company were \$82,384,806. This compares with \$86,121,818 for the corresponding period of 1930, and is a decrease of \$3,737,012, or 4.34 per cent.

The company points out that the decline in dollar sales reflects lower retail food prices, the volume of goods sold being greatly increased The actual quentity of goods sold in February, 1931, measured in tons was 10.72 per cent greater than it was in the same month a year ago And the average weekly tonnage for February of this year was the highest in the history of the company, the previous high figure being in December, 1930, and the next highest in January 1931.

Sales of the company estimated in tons were 443,516 this February, compared with 400,586 in February, 1930, an increase of 42,930. Estimated average weekly tonnage was 110,879, compared with 100,147 a year ago, an increase of 10,732.

weekly dollar sales in February, 1931, were \$20,596,202 compared with \$21,530,454, a decrease of \$934,252.
