Supervisors to List Women for Petit Jury

One of the topics to be considered by the board of supervisors at the session which opened Tuesday will be listing of names for petit juries for circuit and county courts. The lists, which in the past have contained the names of 10 per cent of the male voters in each township, will this time have to include a proportionate number of women voters.

Supervisors from each of the townships must furnish County Clerk Lew A. Hendee with the names of the prospective jurors. In the past the supervisors would draw the names of 10 per cent of the voters in their townships, but all the names were of men.

At this time the 10 per cent of the voters for jury service must include a proportionate number of women's names.

COUNTY POOR CLAIMS LARGEST IN HISTORY

Report to Board Show \$50,911 for Six Months; Deficit Is Expected

Poor claims in Lake county during the six months ending March 1 have drawn \$50,911.76, the largest amount ever distributed for poor relief for a similar period in the history of the county, it was revealed last week at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

The report of the finance committee shows that \$333,688.47 of the \$584,000 appropriated for the year ending Sept. 1, 1931, had been spent by the county during the first six months, leaving a balance of \$250,354.93 to meet the county expenses and claims for the next six months.

Some of the supervisors indicated that efforts will be made during the session of the board to meet the need for increased funds for poor relief. Though \$85,000 was appropriated for poor claims, \$25,000 of the amount was to be applied to the deficit of last year. Based on that amount and the deficit to be met only \$8,088.24 remains to meet the applications for aid during the next six months.

The Lake County hospital, of the larger divisions, shows the largest balance with \$52,234.57 to operate the rest of the year. The hospital was allowed \$89,000, including \$4,000 for repairs. Of the amount \$36,665.43 was spent during the first six months.

The miscellaneous claims which had an appropriation of \$22,000 for the year have but \$509.22 left for the remainder of the year. Claims totaling \$21,490.78 have already been approved.

Other divisions which face large deficits, from the present standing of finances, are the election fund which has spent \$14,965.98 out of the \$15,000 appropriated; justice fees with \$2,209.10 of the \$3,000 allotted, county farm which has spent \$17,950.80 of the \$30,000 appropriated county officers fees with \$18,811.35 of the \$27,000 already disbursed, stationery and supplies with \$4,377.94 of the \$30,000 appropriation left for the remainder of the year.

Petty Named As County Supt. by County Board; Simpson to Springfield

William C. Petty of Antioch, superintendent of graded schools there, on Tuesday became county superintendent of schools to succeed T. A. Simpson, who resigned to become assistant superintendent of public instruction in the state.

Simpson left for Springfield Tuesday. The board of supervisors accepted the Simpson resignation and approved the appointment of Petty who was elected last fall to succeed the incumbent.

In retiring Simpson thanked the board for the 24 years of co-operation and in turn the supervisors passed a resolution expressing appreciation for his services and congratulations at his success in being recognized in educational fields by the appointment.
