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## FINAL RITES FOR EDWARD M. CONRAD

### Funeral Yesterday; Well Known Resident Dies Suddenly Sunday Night

The funeral of Edward M. Conrad, well known and highly esteemed Highland Park resident, who died suddenly Sunday night, was held at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Masonic temple. The Rev. Douglas Cornell of Glencoe officiated, and the Masons had charge of the ceremonies at Memorial Park, where interment took place.

The funeral was attended by a large number of friends and acquaintances, evidencing the widespread regard in which Mr. Conrad was held in Highland Park. The floral tribute was very large and very beautiful, and the expressions of regret at the passing of this splendid citizen were numerous and sincere.

#### Death Was Sudden

The active pallbearers were Leif Norman, Dudley Edwards, James Kent, Paul L. Udell, Chas. F. Grant, and Geo. Bahr. Honorary pallbearers were past exalted rulers of the Highland Park lodge of Elks, as follows: Mr. Howard Moran, Mr. Clifford Moran, Mr. J. P. O'Connell, Mr. Fred Gallagher, Mr. James Collins, Mr. Clyde Wayne Hise.

Widely known and highly esteemed resident of Highland Park for 35 years, who died Sunday night. The funeral was held yesterday.

Mr. Conrad was attending the Granada theatre, on the North Shore, on Sunday evening about nine o'clock, accompanied by Wayne Hise of this city. They had been in the house about twenty minutes when Mr. Conrad complained of feeling ill, and Mr. (Continued on page 50)

## OPENING OF WATER PLANT DRAWS MANY

### Numerous Visitors Saturday and Sunday and All Favorably Impressed

The official opening of Highland Park's new water plant, which was held Saturday and Sunday of last week, attracted much favorable attention. Several hundred visitors inspected the works, and were most enthusiastic in their praise. Those who expected to find only a more or less stupid display of pipes and machinery were pleasantly surprised. Once inside the building they were amazed at the beauty of the structure. Many times the remark was heard, "I never dreamed you had anything like this—why it's wonderful."

#### Modern Construction

Many of the earlier water plants were built with little regard to how the finished result would look. The necessary machinery was thrown together in most any fashion so it would work. A building was put around it and the final result was a depressing structure only to be visited when necessary. Modern practice is very different.
