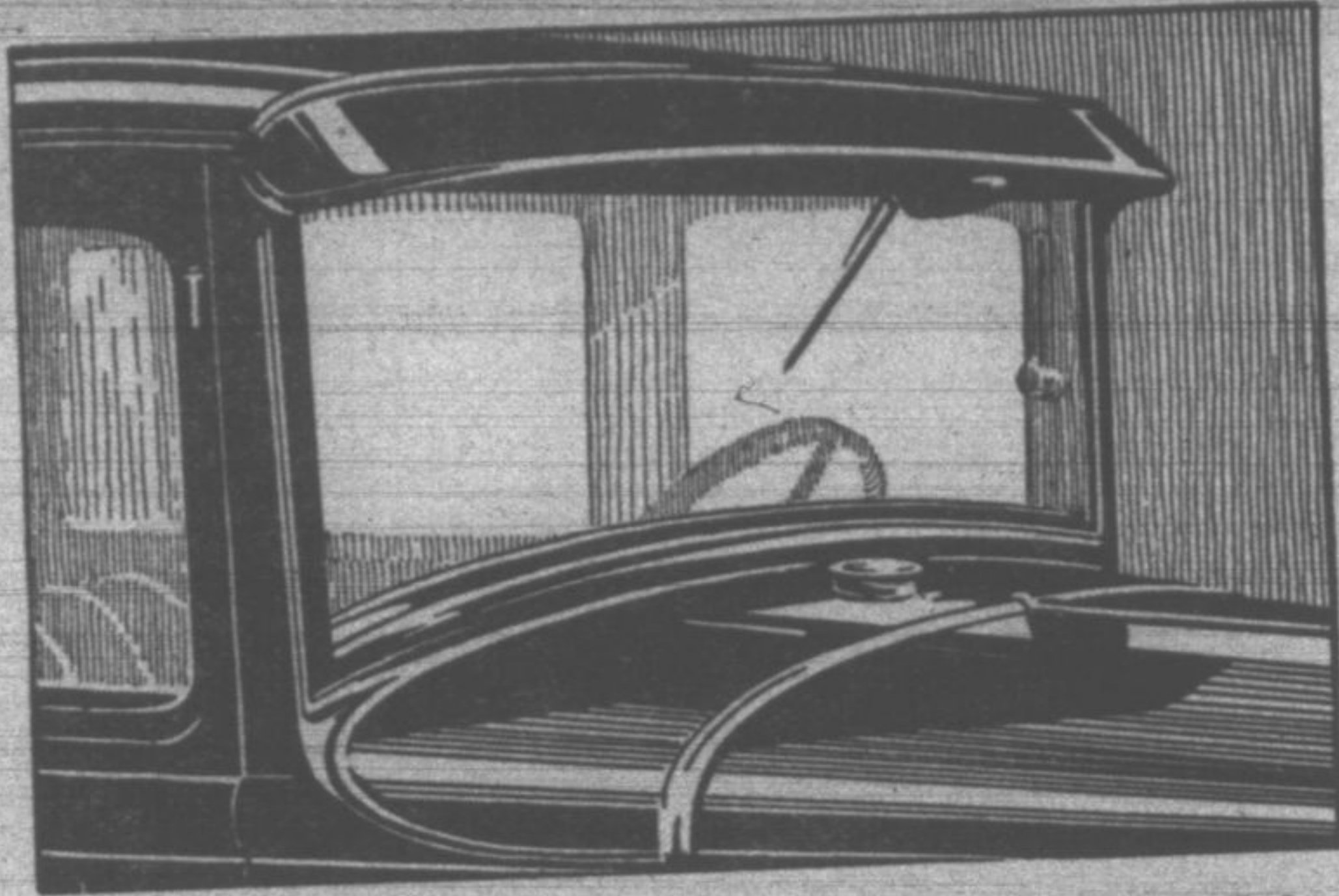

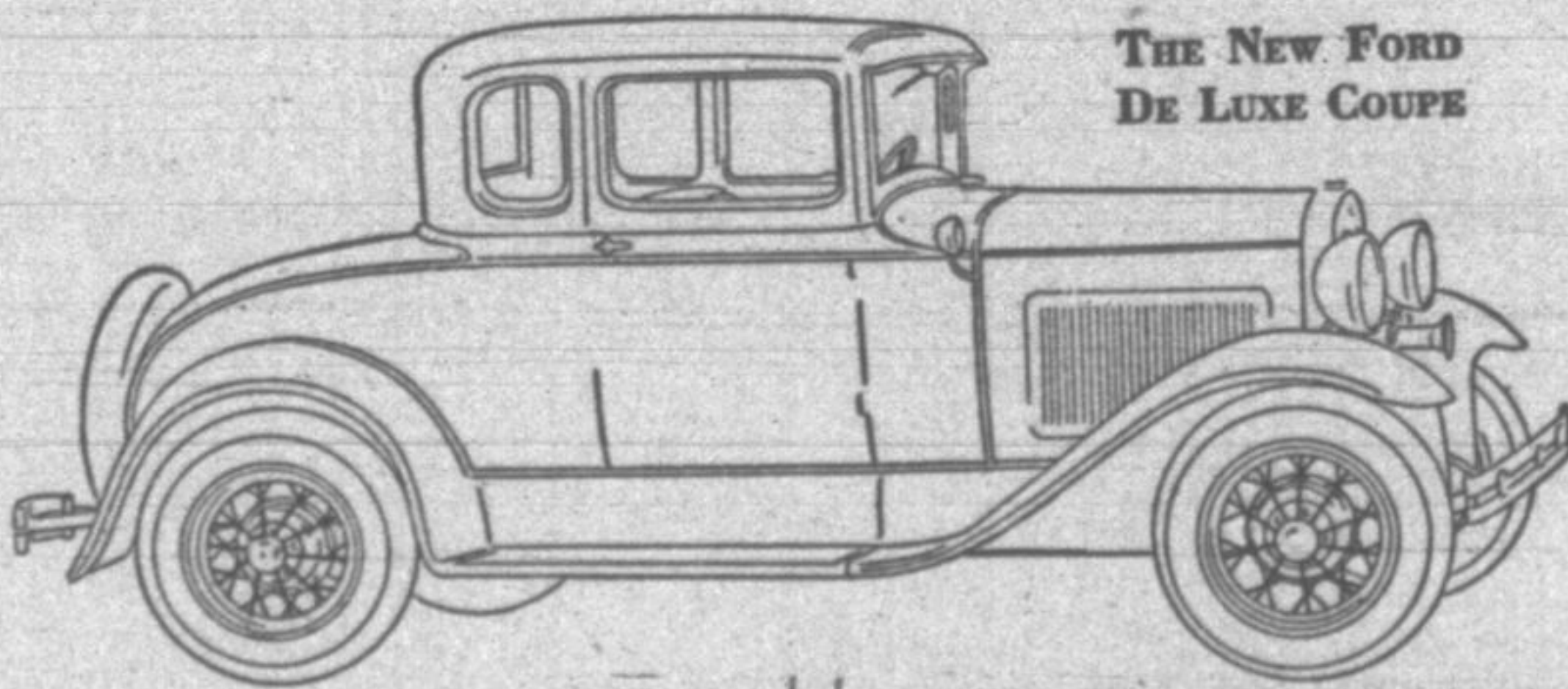

## Deerfield State Bank Plans New Structure; Let Contracts Soon

A new building to house their business is being planned by officials of the Deerfield State Bank, according to an announcement made a few days ago. The site, already purchased, is a lot 32 feet wide and 124 feet deep on Waukegan road, a half block north of the present building.

Architect's plans are now under consideration by the directors. It is understood that the new structure will contain all the fixtures necessary to modern banking systems. The cost is estimated at from \$35,000 to \$40,000. The contract is to be let within a few days. Officials consider that the new building should be ready for occupancy by about July 1, at which time there will be a formal opening.
