## Construction Work by State in Two Years Exceeds \$14,000,000

More than \$14,000,000 worth of con-  
struction will have been completed  
in Illinois within two years when the  
present biennium ends June 30, ac-  
cording to the figures of the state  
architect's office. More than \$10,000,-  
000 of the amount was spent for  
construction work for the department  
of public work and buildings.

Despite the fact that the building  
program was a record one for Illi-  
nois, the state architect's office, it  
was said, handled the work with all  
possible speed, not only to take ad-  
vantage of the low building material  
prices, but to provide employment  
and assist in alleviating the unem-  
ployment situation.

## BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

### Happenings About This Part of North Shore; Doings at the County Seat

Waukegan's new street car loop,  
with a line running on County street  
to relieve traffic congestion on Gene-  
see street, will be in operation by  
May 1, officials of the North Shore  
Line report.

Bids on the construction of the  
proposed \$244,000 extension to the  
breakwater of the Waukegan harbor  
will be received at the office of the  
United States district engineer in  
Chicago on March 26.

Zion's long fight over the owner-  
ship and control of the parks and  
highways today found its way into  
the supreme court when injunction  
proceedings heard in circuit court in  
Waukegan were appealed last week.

W. C. Petty, county superintendent  
of schools, last week started his tour  
of inspection of the county school  
system. He visited Antioch and  
Mundelein. The county superintend-  
et was a guest at a banquet held in  
his honor recently at Antioch by the  
school teachers.

Sixty new citizens were welcomed  
last week at a meeting held at the  
court house in Waukegan, by the  
American Legion, with the assistance  
of the Legion Auxiliary and the D.  
A. R.

Four temporary injunctions against  
Waukegan and North Chicago saloons  
have been ordered in federal court  
and notices served on the owners, it  
became known late last week when  
federal agents entered the two cities.

Federal income tax revenues on  
1930 incomes of Waukegan residents  
shows a decrease of about fourteen  
per cent from revenues of the previ-  
ous year according to information re-  
leased by Frank P. Worack, collector  
of internal revenue at Waukegan.

Passage of a special 2-mill assess-  
ment tax to provide funds for the  
construction of a special tank wagon  
for use of the Antioch fire depart-  
ment in combatting fires in the outly-  
ing districts, will be decided by Anti-  
och voters at the regular election on  
April 21st.
