

ADVANCE BILL TO CUT COUNTY BOARD

Paddock's Measure to Reduce Supervisors' Numbers Is Amended

Senator Ray Paddock's bill proposing a change in the law which would cut down the size of the county board of supervisors last week was recalled to second reading so that an amendment could be offered.

The amendment would make the

bill applicable to counties of more than 100,000 in population only and was to be offered by Paddock. This would take in only the larger counties that want the bill.

Limits Assistants

Paddock's bill would limit the number of assistant supervisors. Under the present law each town has one supervisor and an assistant for every 2,500 persons after a deduction of 5,000. The suggested change would give an assistant for every 5,000 persons after the deduction.

The new board of supervisors in Lake county, unless the Paddock bill

is passed, would contain 45 members. The number, county officials have advised Paddock, is excessive for economical procedure.

As town elections are to be held through Lake county April 7, some of the candidates running for assistant supervisor would not be seated in the event of the passage of the Paddock bill.

Lake county would come in the classification of the bill by a scant 3,000 people as the population figures for 1930 placed the county at 103,000.

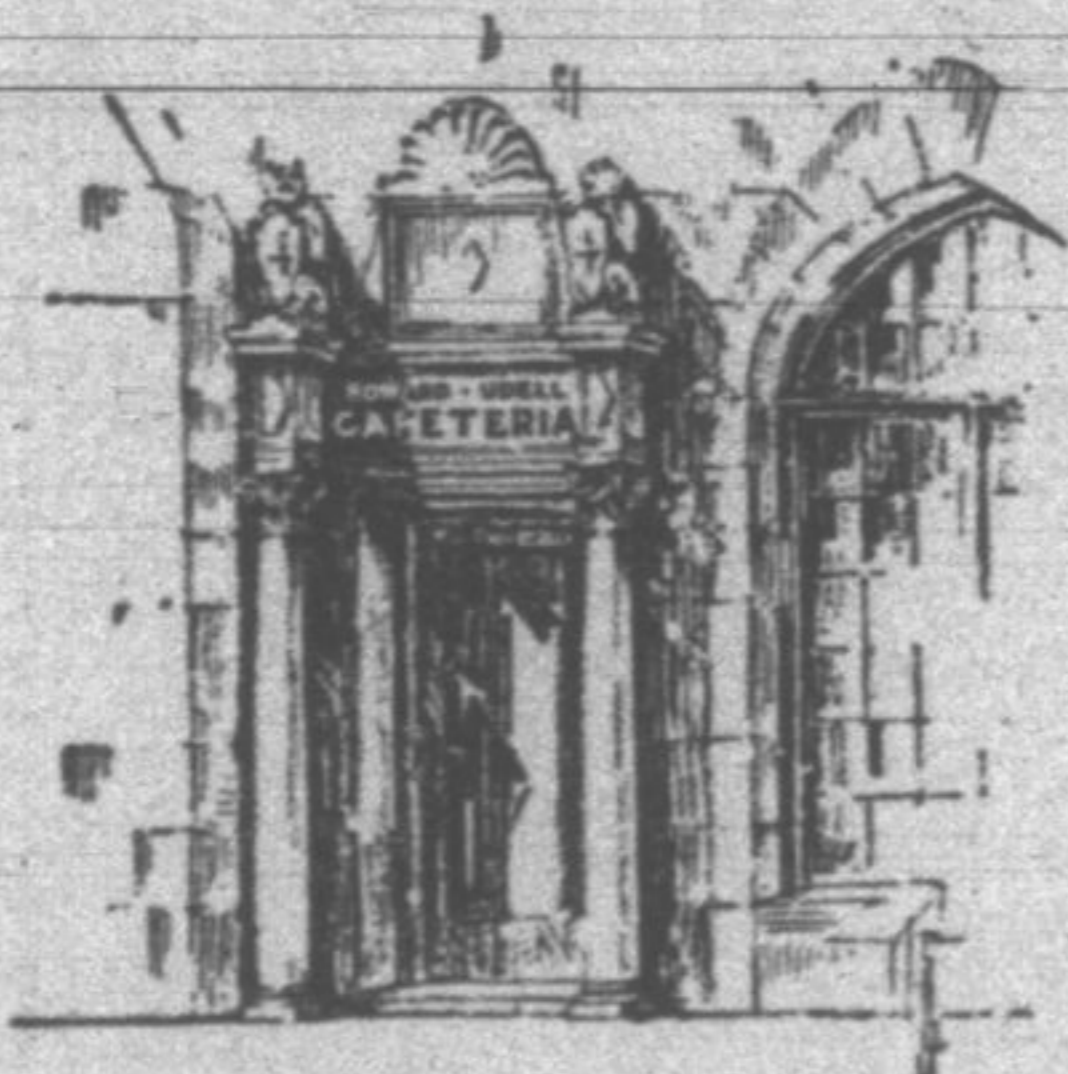
