Henry F. Meyer Dies; Funeral Held Yesterday

Henry Frederick Meyer passed away Sunday morning, March 22, at the St. Francis hospital in Evanston, following an operation. Mr. Meyer was born Jan. 25, 1870 in Nendorf, Germany. He came to Deerfield in the spring of 1892. Mr. Fred Meyer, the Deerfield postmaster, had returned to Germany for a visit and helped eight German boys and girls to come to America. In this group was Henry Meyer. He came directly to Deerfield and lived at the August Winters' home until his marriage to Miss Ernestine Pioch of Chicago on March 26, 1893. The ceremony was performed at the Winters' home. Twelve children were born to this union, seven of whom preceded their father in death.

Mr. Meyer had been employed as a brick maker during his thirty-nine years in Deerfield. He is survived by his widow, five children, Mrs. Annie Lockman of Crystal Lake, Mrs. Mamie Sticken and Albert Meyer of Deerfield, Mrs. Marie Baumhardt and Mrs. Edith White of Chicago and 14 grandchildren. He has been a member of St. Paul's church since 1892. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at St. Paul's church with Rev. Piepenbrok officiating, and burial was in the Deerfield cemetery.

Arbor and Bird Day Books Now Available

Very attractive arbor and bird day books for 1931 have been issued by Francis G. Blair, state superintendent of public instruction.
