built that were not only highly efficient, but which were also most attractive to look upon. Moreover they discovered that careful thought given to the grouping of the units and of the equipment not only served to make them attractive, but it made them less expensive to build. Just as the ridiculous looking early models of automobiles, which looked like machine shops on wheels, have developed into the trim and efficient cars of today, so the modern industrial plant is a simplified and beautified descendant of an uncouth ancestor.

Visitors See Plant Operate

The visitors who streamed through the new water works on Saturday and Sunday were met by guides who took them through every department. They saw how the dirty water came in from the Lake — how the mud was "coagulated" and settled out — then how the water was put through huge filters to remove the last trace of dirt. Bottles of filtered water were compared with bottles of distilled water. The visitors could not tell the difference. Samples taken from the lake during the past month were on display. Just how much of filth and dirt the plant has been removing could be seen with the naked eye. It was a wonderful object lesson.

As the guests left the building they carried with them these impressions: "Highland Park has a water plant which could hardly be improved upon. It is a splendid piece of construction designed and built by experts. And moreover, it is doing a bang-up job — its giving us water that we can brag about."

Always Welcome

The official opening is over, but the plant is still on the lake front. Visitors are welcome at all times, though daylight is best for inspection. Those who have not visited the works are urged to do so. They will find their time well spent, even if they do not know a water pump from a golf ball.

The mayor and commissioners appreciated very deeply the interest which was shown in this informal dedication. They feel that the construction of the new water works was a big step in the civic betterment of the community, and they ask all the residents of Highland Park to join them in pride of the accomplishment.
