

FINAL RITES FOR EDWARD M. CONRAD

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Hise accompanied him to their car, thinking a ride in the fresh air would help. Mr. Conrad's condition did not improve, and Mr. Hise took him to a physician's office on the fourth floor of a building on West Elm street. They were just leaving the elevator when Mr. Conrad succumbed. Later examination revealed that death was due to a cardiac embolism, a blood clot in the left uricle of the heart.

Lived Here 35 Years

Edward M. Conrad was born Sept. 16, 1889, at Niles Center, Ill., a son of Mathias C. and the late Frances J. Conrad. He had been a resident of Highland Park for 35 years. For some years he was occupied in the banking business and for the past eight years had been conducting the Glencoe Electric shop, at Glencoe, of which he was the owner.

During the world war Mr. Conrad served in the quartermaster's department and was about to be sent overseas when the Armistice was signed. He was an active member of Dumar-esq Spencer post of the America Legion, secretary of Sunset Valley Golf club and a member of the Glencoe Chamber of Commerce. He was always active in all movements for community welfare, aiding all local organizations of that character by his efforts and contributions wherever possible.

Affiliations

Mr. Conrad was secretary of the Highland Park Elks lodge from its organization until two years ago, when he resigned that office because of poor health. He was still a trustee of the lodge at his death. He was also a member of the A. O. Fay Masonic lodge and of the Royal Arch chapter.

Relatives Living

No Highland Park resident had more friends than Ed Conrad, and none merited loyal friendship more, as he was one of the best liked and most respected men in the community, his exemplary life and many sterling qualities having endeared him to all who knew him during his long residence in this community, and there is widespread sorrow at his sudden death. The family has the deep sympathy of the entire community.

On January 12, 1924, Mr. Conrad married Miss Viola A. Pansie, niece of Mr. Fritz Bahr. The widow survives and other living relatives are his aged father, Mathias C. Conrad of this city; three brothers, Mathias H., and George F. of Highland Park; and Frank Conrad of Wilmette; and one sister, Mrs. Helen Golden, also of this city. One brother, John, died suddenly Sept. 10, 1928, and another brother, Robert J., passed away about 18 years ago. There are three nephews and five nieces living.
