The first April program of the Group of Public Spirited Citizens Form Body; Aim Is Civic Welfare

Having the welfare of this community at heart, a meeting of a large group of public spirited citizens of Highland Park was recently held to complete the permanent organization of the City Club of Highland Park. The club has been incorporated under the laws of the state of Illinois as a corporation organized not for profit, with its purpose, as stated in its charter, being, "to promote, encourage and assist in, the administration of public affairs in an economical and efficient manner."

The by-laws of the club, adopted at that meeting, further detail the club's objects as follows:

1. The study and improvement of municipal conditions and public affairs in the City of Highland Park. 2. To formulate and promote constructive

plans for the future. 3 .- To provide an impartial body, to which the public may turn for guidance with absolute confidence in the sincerity of its mo-

4.-To provide a means of informing the citizens of Highland Park of civic conditions

5.- To provide a body which will take a stand and raise an authoritative voice on public questions and communicate directly with public officials through its duly authorized officers or committee.

6.-To afford one interested in public welfare an opportunity to exchange ideas with men of like interests. (Continued on page 52)
