The funeral of Mrs. Agnes M. Bergen, widow of the late Dr. Lloyd M. Bergen, and formerly for many years a resident of this city, was held at Trinity church at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, the Rev. Christoph Keller officiating, and interment was in Rosehill cemetery, Chicago. Many friends of the family attended the obsequies.

Mrs. Bergen's death occurred Mar. 28, at Charlottesville, Va., where she had made her home during the last 10 years, since the death of her husband, which occurred in Highland Park. She was born in Chicago, Aug. 22, 1869, and came to Highland Park with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McFarlane, in 1880. Her marriage to Dr. Bergen was solemnized June 14, 1892.

The children are Mrs. Charles Mansur of Highland Park, and L. V. Bergen of Virginia. Two brothers and two sisters of the decedent are H. F. McFarlane and Alan McFarlane of Virginia, Mrs. C. E. Howell of Hinsdale, Ill., and Mrs. C. D. Heile of Oak Park, Ill.

Mrs. Bergen was a well known and greatly beloved resident of Highland Park for forty years, during which time she gained many warm friends in the community by whom the news of her death was received with expressions of keen regret. The family has the deep sympathy of the community at this time.
