

CLUBS SPONSORING EASTER EGG HUNT

First Annual Affair of Kind to Be Held April 6, Sunset Park; Scouts Aid

The Lions club of Highland Park sponsors of the first annual Easter egg hunt, will be ably assisted by local clubs of Boy Scouts of America, according to Harry L. Allen, director of recreation for Highland Park Community Service.

The Boy Scouts who have been a great assistance in many local civic programs, will be on hand to help supervise the areas where the eggs are hidden and to render assistance to the smaller children both before and during the hunt.

Makes Survey

Myron C. Rybolt, Scout executive of the north shore area made a survey of that portion of Sunset park where the hunt is to be staged and is making full plans for the Scouts' participation which will greatly facilitate the program. Twenty-five hundred eggs will be hidden and certain prizes will draw special prizes. The prizes and prizes have been purchased by the Lions club. The park board is cooperating in this event and will have the shelter houses open and closed as a protection against chilly weather while the children and their leaders are waiting for the start of the hunt. Teachers of the public and parochial schools will accompany children to the shelter houses of the park where they will be organized for the hunt.

Hours of Assembling

Children of pre-school age, kindergarten children and first grade children will assemble at the shelter houses at 3 p. m. Children in the second, third, and fourth grades will assemble at 4 p. m.
