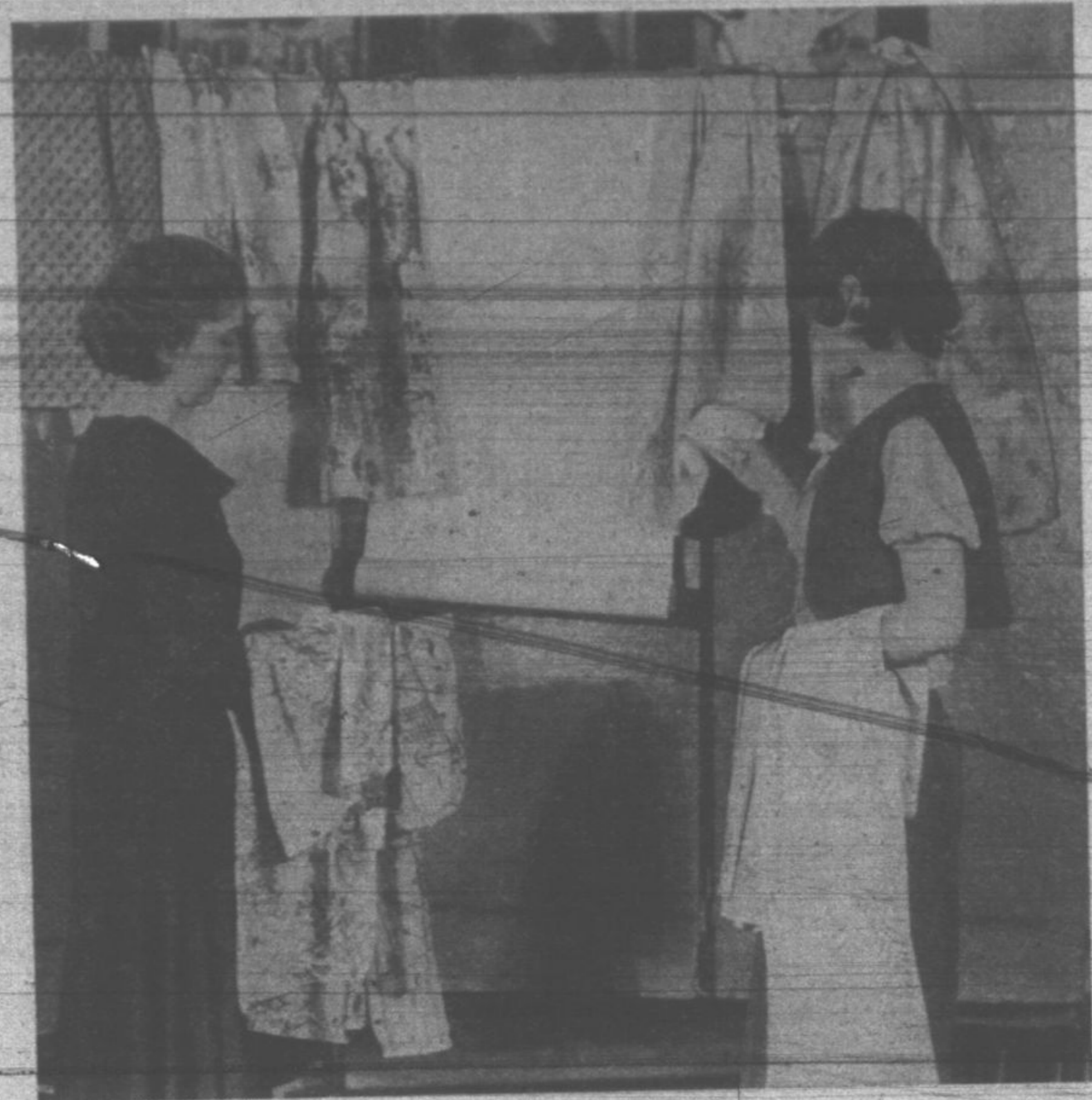

BILL TO AUGMENT STATE POLICE FORCE

Senator Dunlap Favors Improvements in System to Aid War on Crime

A bill which provides for augmentation of the state police force and for the adoption of several important improvements for efficiency of service has been introduced into the Illinois senate by Senator Henry M. Dunlap, veteran author of police bills. These headquarters men, will work in against crime in the state.

Walter Moody, chief of the highway police, and Dunlap have been in consultation about the matter several times lately, and believes that the time has come for the increase of the state forces, which now number 300 men.

Plan Nine Districts

It is proposed to divide the state into nine districts, with headquarters in each. It is proposed also to install a broadcasting outfit in the state headquarters and have men on duty for 24 hours in each of the district headquarters to receive any message that may be relayed from Springfield. These headquarters men will work in eight-hour shifts.

"Such a measure will greatly increase the efficiency of the highway police force," Senator Dunlap said. "Whenever a crime of importance is committed in any section of the state it can be communicated to the general headquarters so that in a few minutes every highway patrolman will have been advised and be on the lookout for the bandits."

Study Cost

Along the same line, the house committee heard a resolution introduced

by Representative David Hunter, of Rockford, providing an investigation into the cost and feasibility of equipping state highway police with radio.

Representative Hunter says that the highway police of New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts are using teletype machines like those used in many newspaper offices to receive press reports, and Pennsylvania is now equipping its force similarly. Michigan is furnishing its police force with radio. Both of these means of communication will be considered by the committee.

Woman Candidate for Supervisor Weds and Retires from Contest

Mrs. Jeanette Kellogg Aiken, of Winthrop Harbor, well known throughout Lake county, both in society and politics, last week was married to John F. Black of Toronton, Can., the marriage taking place in Chicago.

Mr. Black, a mining engineer arrived from Canada two days previously. Mrs. Black is a candidate for supervisor, but according to her daughter, she will not enter the race, says a Waukegan newspaper, although her name will be on the ballot, as the withdrawal period has elapsed. Mrs. Black has been active in various political campaign, working for Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick and for Sheriff L. Tiffany. She was on the first panel of women drawn to serve on a jury in Lake county.

Mrs. Aiken has been a widow since 1924 when her husband, Col. Robert H. Aiken, an inventor died.
