Bandit Trio Returns to Highwood in Two More Raids March 26

Returning to the scene of their two robberies of March 20, three bandits held up and robbed a Highwood filling station of \$85 and a photograph studio of \$80 Thursday night, March 26, in each case forcing employes and patrons into rear rooms while they fled.

In the robbery of the filling station, one bandit held a revolver to

the head of William Schmidt, attendant, and another prodded his side with a gun while he opened the safe where the cash was stored.

The three bandits are the same as those who robbed an ice cream parlor and another filling station Friday, Chief Walter Henderson believes. Each of the four robberies was staged in the same manner. In each case the thugs escaped in an auto. Partial descriptions were obtained.

The three men walked into the photography gallery, the Cutilla Music and Photo studio, at 9:25 o'clock on Thursday night, where they forced a clerk and two patrons into a washroom after they looted the cash register. While the imprisoned men were forcing the door open, the bandits escaped.

At 10:55 o'clock Schmidt, alone at the Standard Oil filling station two blocks distant, was surprised by the three men who forced him to open the safe. Schmidt was then locked in a washroom while the men fled.
