The Girl Reserve movement is an organization within the Y.W.C.A. for girls of ten to

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eighteen. International in its aspect as a member of the World Committee of the Y. W. C. A. In other words, the Girl Reserves are junior members of the Y.W.C.A.

The object of the Girl Reserves movement is to make a contribution to those elements in the life of a girl which sets free the ideals and convictions that help her to live the happiest sort of a life. It aids her to grow, through normal activities, into the habits, insights and ideals which will make her a responsible, eager woman.

Girl Reserves are grouped according to their ages and interests. These groups are called "Triangles" and the whole group is guided by an adult who is called an advisor.

The base of the Blue Triangle is SPIRIT; the two sides, KNOWLEDGE and HEALTH. This means that a Girl Reserve is mentally and morally trained.

The Girl Reserves have a salute. This salute is made by placing the thumb of the right hand in the middle of the palm. The right hand is then brought in salute to the place on the left arm where the Girl Reserve armband is worn, the right elbow being held straight from the body and on a horizontal line so that a triangle is formed by the arm and body.

To symbolize the four principles of development in a girl's life the four fingers have been chosen representing: MIND, BODY, SPIRIT, AND SERVICE.

Every true Girl Reserve is striving: "To face life squarely, to seek and give the best."

**Highland Park Woman
Gets Estate of War
Veteran; Her Father**

After 10 years of investigations and researches by the United States government into the past records of Charles Nordeen, who was killed in France during the World war, the estate of the soldier was closed late last week in probate court by Judge Martin C. Decker and the soldier's only heir, a daughter, Mrs. Genevieve Pflugner of Highland Park, received the residue of the \$10,000 government insurance.

Nordeen, the government found after an exhaustive search of war records, went under the name of Charles Golden. When the claims were first filed with the government for the insurance because of the other name he had used.

When the matter was brought to the Lake county probate court government officials delved into the enlistment and draft records and war records. When it was found that Nordeen and Golden were the names of the same man, the government turned over the war insurance to the Nordeen estate.

Mrs. Pflugner received about \$8,500 despite the long legal fight which brought with it many fees.
