Metzler and Mayor Lewis, the meeting promises to be a large one and the League urges everyone to be in the auditorium before eight o'clock.

Talk on City Court to Be Feature of C. of C. Meeting Next Tuesday

Mr. Marvin Wallach, a Highland Park resident, will speak on "The Advantage and Disadvantages of a City Court," at the regular monthly dinner meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday evening, April 14, at 6:30 o'clock in the Green Tea Pot.

Mr. Wallach's speech will deal with the fact that there are various such courts now in existence which have proved satisfactory. The idea is that the judge will be elected by the townspeople and paid either by the county or state. Should a city court be established in Highland Park, those bringing civil action will save considerable time by not having to go to Waukegan. It is also pointed out that the city court can handle the work of police magistrate, if need be.

The deferred matter of the proposed increase in dues will be brought up at the meeting of the Chamber Tuesday night.

The directors are hoping for a large turnout, as the matters to be considered are of interest to all members.

Scout Troop No. 30 Rotary Club Guests; Fine Program Given

Monday noon the scouts of Troop 30 were the guests of the Highland Park Rotary club at luncheon at the Moraine hotel. This club sponsors Troop 30. There were about twenty-five scouts present with their scoutmaster, John L. Udell. Mr. Boltz and the scout executive, Myron Rybolt, were also present and helped with the program.

After the members of the Rotary club had been seated in the dining room the scouts marched in with flags. They gave the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the scout oath. Then all sat down to a fine dinner which consisted of chicken and all requisite accessories. Everyone agreed that it was a fine meal. Mr. Udell said if there was a thirteenth law it should be, "A scout is hungry."

During our dinner there was mass singing and afterwards Mr. Boltz led in two songs. After the singing, Fred Reichardt, with the aid of three other boys, gave a first aid demonstration of three different ways of carrying injured persons. Then the four patrols put on their individual humorous stunts and gave the Rotary members a few laughs. Bill Larson gave a talk on "What Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan did for me."

Fred Reichardt spoke on "The Future of Troop 30," and said that he believed Troop 30 would be one of the best troops in Highland Park within the year.

After discussing an appropriate name for this new chapter and talking over numerous plans for the future, the meeting was adjourned. Refreshments were served in the dining room, the table beautifully decorated with flags and red, white, and blue candles, favors, cakes and candy.

Eighteen children were present and many more are expected to increase the number in the near future.

The objects of the society are to promote good citizenship, develop character, create respect for law and order, loyalty to and appreciation of the meaning of America, and to instill true love for peace and good will among nations.

Deerfield Schools to Hold Election April 11
