Fire Chief Explains Value of Plan: To Be Voted on at City Election

"With the Civil Service act to be placed before the citizens of Highland Park at the coming city election, April 21, for consideration, the members of both the police and fire departments wish to acquaint the people of this city with the desirability of Civil Service," said Fire Chief Edward C. Hoskins yesterday, "as we all feel that it will put both departments on a sound business basis, under uniform rules and regulations.

"Under Civil Service," explained by Chief Hoskins, "all applicants for either police or fire department duty will be required to pass both physical and mental examinations and will be rated according to their ability, thus assuring the men taking the examinations of a fair and impartial rating. Both departments are important factors in city government. The personnel of these departments must be of the highest physical and mental types; by Civil Service this will be assured. In addition, under Civil Service the men may look forward to advancing themselves to the grade that their abilities allow whenever vacancies occur, thus insuring the men of an opportunity to advance themselves.

"Ninety per cent of the men," continued Chief Hoskins, "are married and have years of service in their department. They carry their responsibilities in an honest and upright manner and feel that with the adoption of civil service the department will be placed on a par with other cities in our state. The residents of Highland Park can assist in this important issue by voting in favor of the civil service act. Both of the departments have enjoyed the respect and confidence of our city officails both past and present, and do not wish to create the impression that either department has been unfairly treated."
