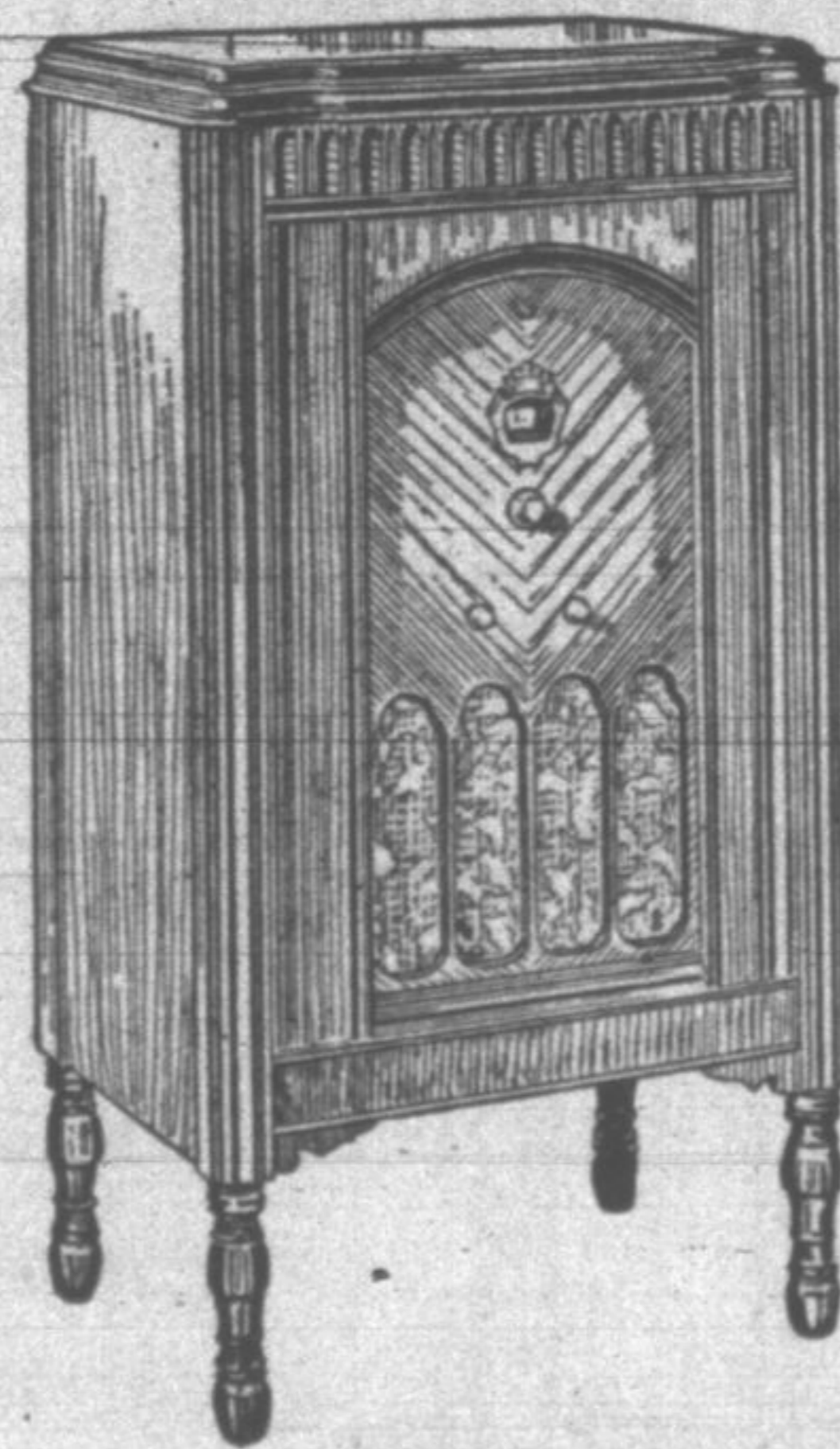
Pilot Dies Here After Crash at Sky Harbor
