He was later to be joined by Rockne in California. The two men had
been friends for many years. Rockne's plane crashed at Bazaar, Kansas, near Emporia, causing the instant death of its six passengers and
two pilots. Friends who had believed
that Ewell had left on the same plane
were anxious for his fate and temporarily puzzled when his name did
not appear among the dead.


