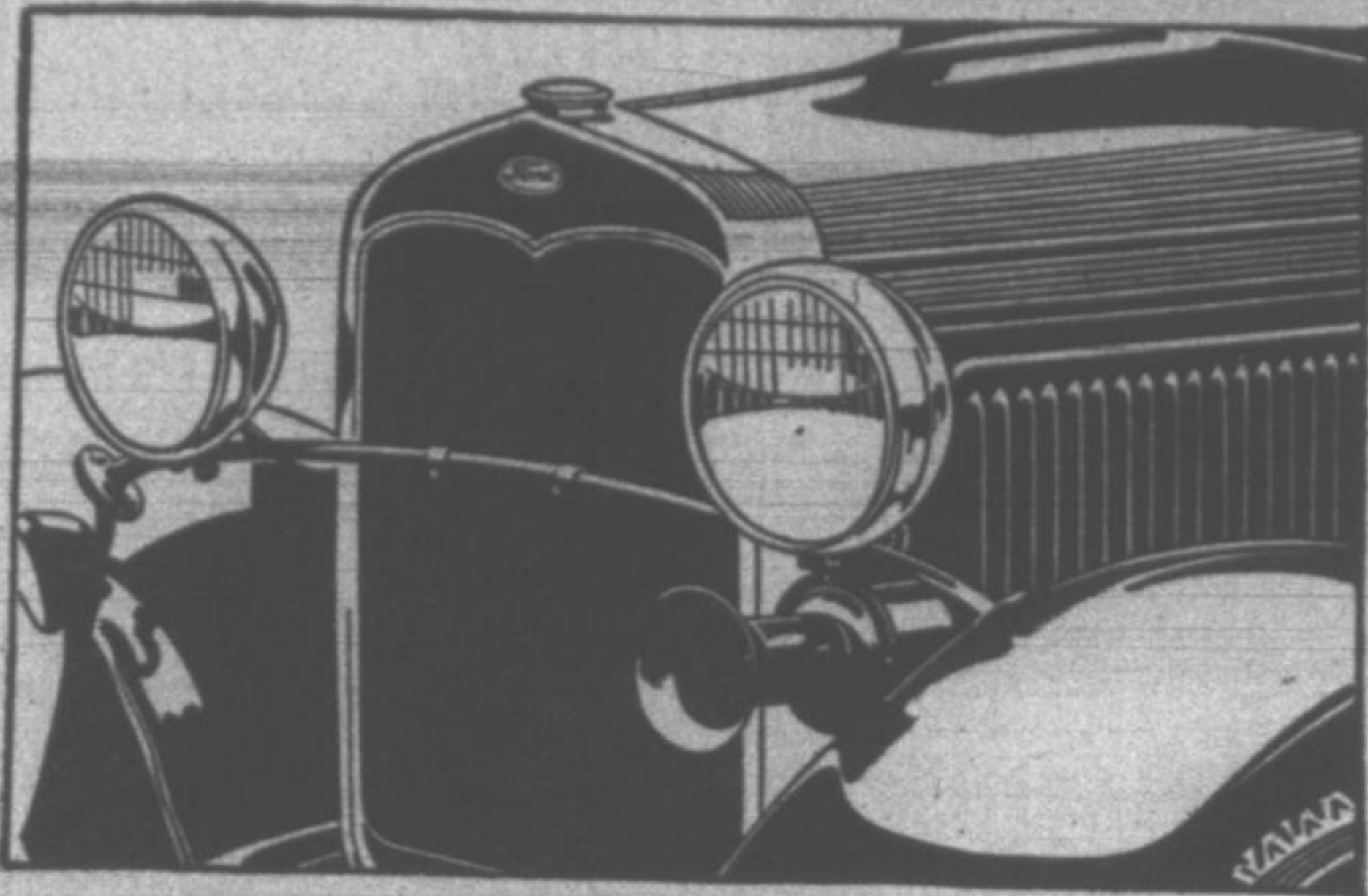

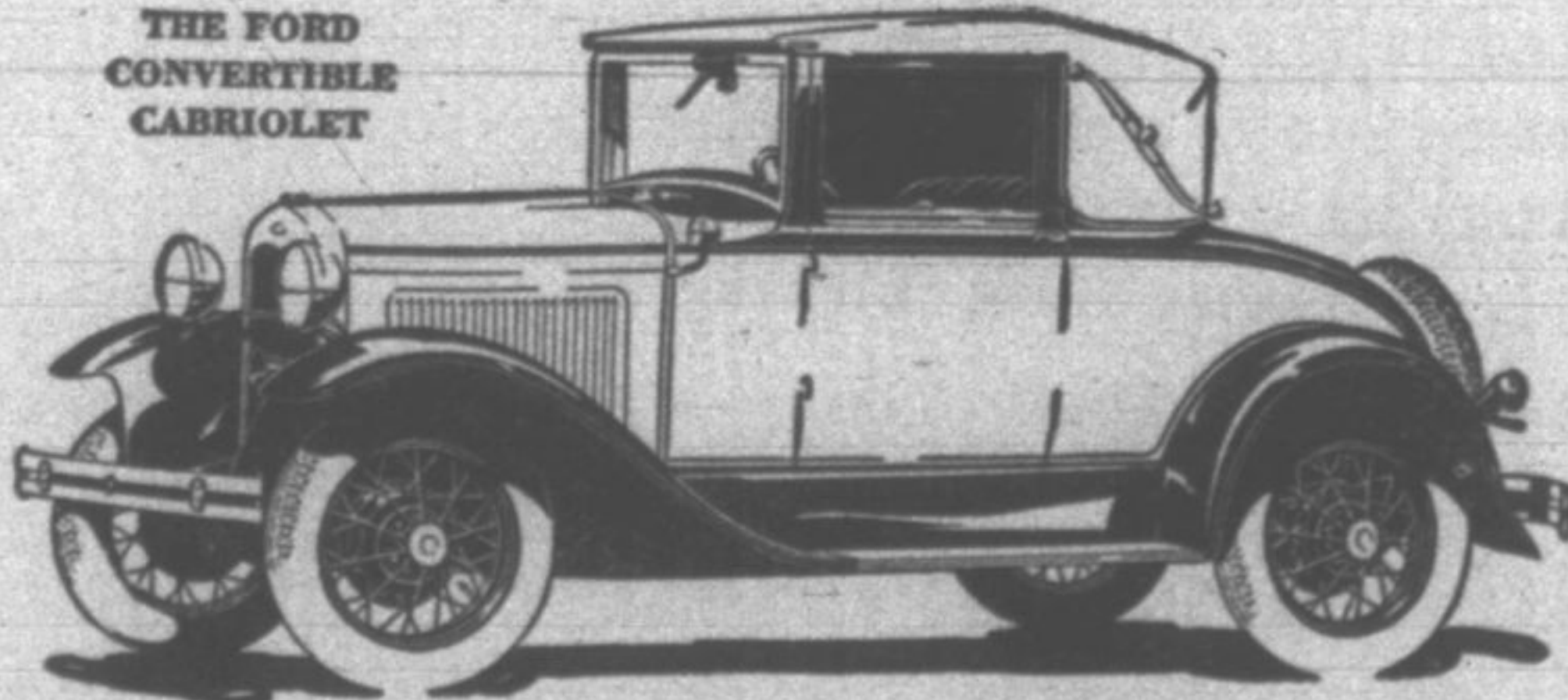

Soldier Is Accused of Robbing Two Men Near Lake Bluff Last Week

A soldier, Sergeant Gibson, was arrested at Fort Sheridan last week by Chief Eugene Spaid of Lake Bluff, charged with having been one of two men from the army post who robbed two Racine men of \$167, a watch, and a Vellie sedan. The man has been identified by the two victims, Roy Livingstone of the Wagner hotel and Charles Sprader of 2321 Meade street, Racine.

The two were homeward bound from Chicago when they learned of a dice game progressing at the fort, they told Spaid later, and stopped to take part. After winning considerable money they again started for Racine. Two soldiers who had been in the game asked for a ride to Waukegan.

As they passed the home of Mrs. Scott Durand, near Lake Bluff, the soldiers drew pistols and informed their hosts that a stickup was in progress. They took \$82 and his car from Livingstone and robbed Sprader of \$85 and his watch. They missed \$50 which Livingstone had in an inside pocket.

The robbers then forced the two Racine men to get out of the car and drove south. Livingstone and Sprader reported the matter to Chief Spaid at Lake Bluff, who kept them at the station all night and took them to Fort Sheridan next day to attempt to identify the men. Army authorities co-operated in the search, which resulted in the arrest of Sergeant Gibson.

School Enrollment in Lake County in 1930

Lake county is listed as one of the twenty-six counties in the entire state which had a higher enrollment in public elementary schools in 1930 than forty years ago in a school report released by the International News Service. Lake County is also one of thirty-five of the 102 counties of Illinois showing increased enrollment during the past ten years.

Seventy-six counties of the state were lower in their public elementary school enrollment in 1930 than forty years ago, a condition which is due largely to the fact that large numbers of young people remained in the elementary schools between the ages of fourteen to twenty-one years forty years ago.

Lake county had its largest enrollment in 1930 when 14,371 pupils were taking elementary courses. In 1920 there were 9,472 enrolled, 7,724 in 1910, with 6,149 in 1900, and 4,395 in 1890.

For the entire state, 1,094,788 were enrolled in 1930 as against 939,295 for 1920. Forty years ago there were 769,708 pupils enrolled in state elementary public schools.
