A meeting of the session of the Deerfield Presbyterian church will be held Thursday evening, April 9, at the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. Johnston Davis.

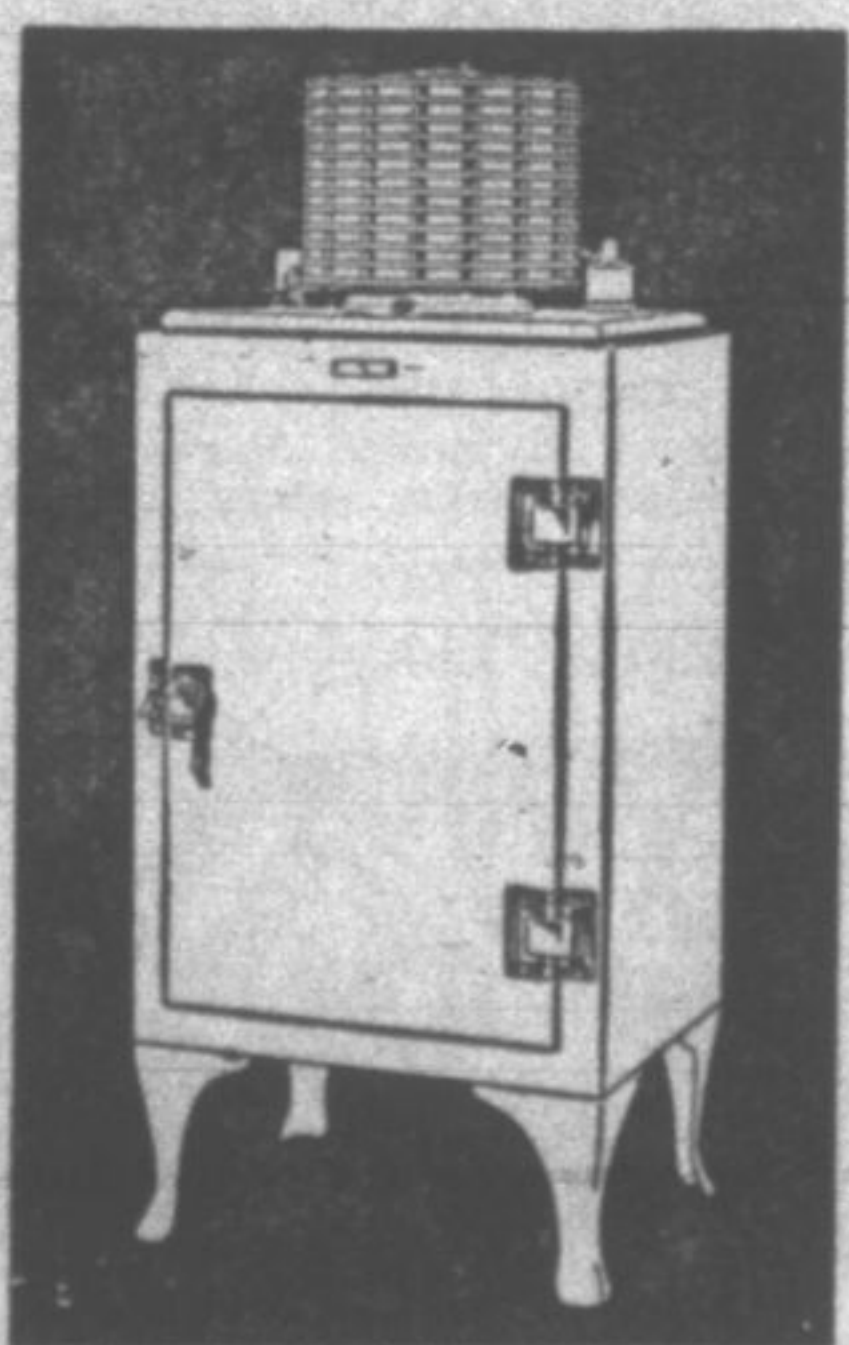

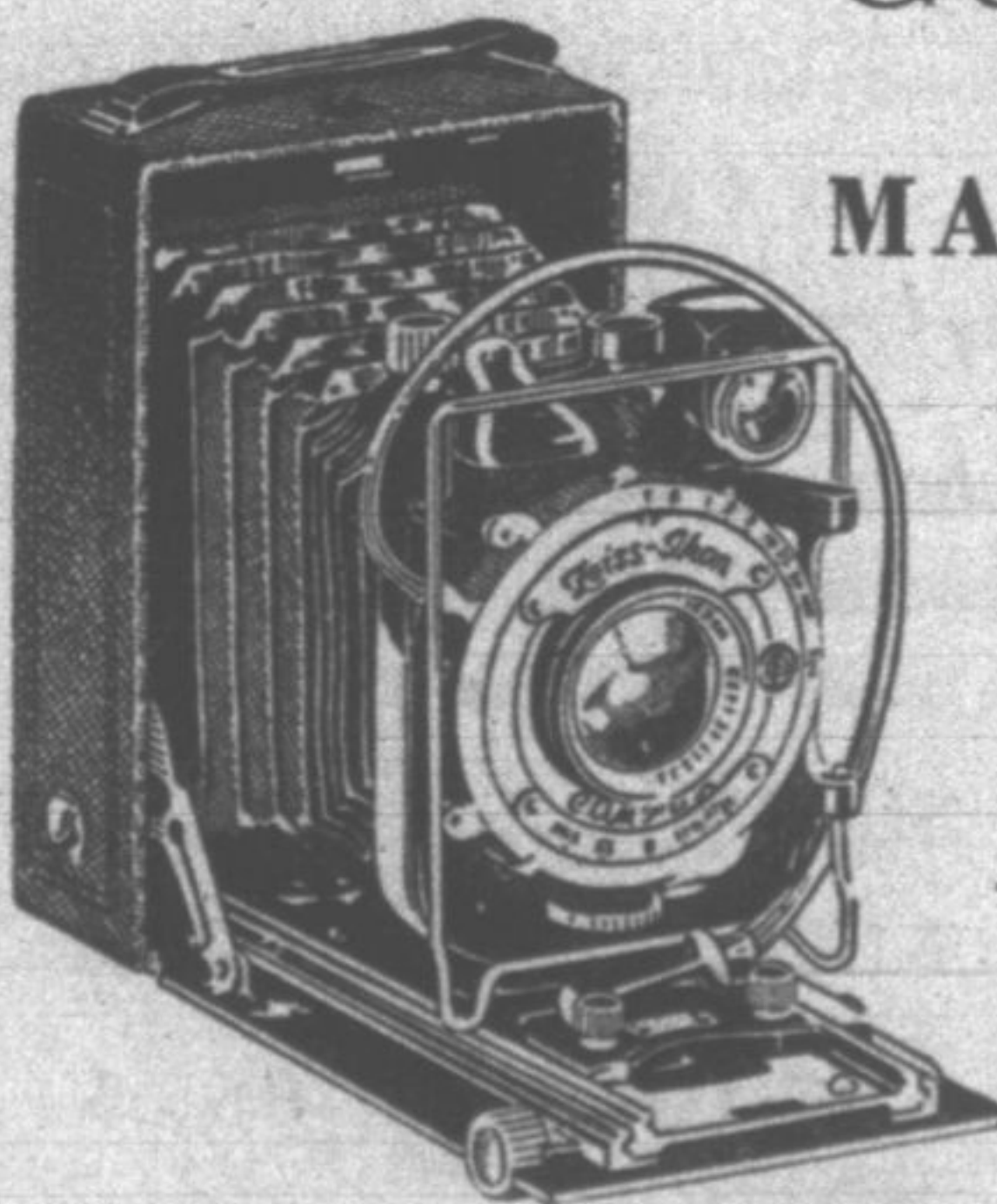
