

STEWART GARDNER, GOLF EXPERT, DIES

Well Known Professional of Exmoor Club Passes; Funeral Held Wednesday

Stewart Gardner, golf professional at the Exmoor club for the last ten years, died Sunday at his home 1010 Green Bay road, Highland Park, after a lingering illness. He was 53 years old.

Gardner, a native of Prestwick, Scotland, was one of the first of the Scottish professionals to come to the United States. In 1899 he took his first position at Lenox, Mass. Later he was professional successively at the Garden City Club, Long Island, the Exmoor club, the Old Elm club, and then at Exmoor again.

Second in 1902 Open

Teamed with Walter Travis, Gardner won several minor titles from 1901 to 1904. In 1902, he and Travis tied for second in the national open.

After his return to Exmoor in 1921 Gardner became a student of greens and golf course architecture and helped design several new courses. He also was active in the Professional Golfers' association, in which he held the office of vice-president and secretary.

Alex Pirie, professional at Old Elm, spoke of Gardner's death as a great loss to golf.

"He was one of the best teachers the game ever had," Pirie said. "He (Continued on page 46)

Dr. Sweet has written a number of books, among them are: "Birth and Infancy of Jesus," "Self Portrayal of Shakespeare," "A Study of the English Bible," "Roman Emperor Worship," "The Verification of Christianity," "The Makin' o' Joe," and "To Christ Through Evolution."
