Baseball Contest for Grade School Boys are Scheduled for April 29

A community-wide baseball tournament will be held at Sunset park at four o'clock p. m. on Wednesday, April 29, under the supervision of Community Service and the Park district. All boys from Lake Forest, Highland Park, Deerfield, Ravinia, and Highwood grammar schools, West Ridge school, and parochial schools are eligible.

The contest consists of special activities in baseball. There will be a pitching contest for accuracy and distance. In the pitch for accuracy, a wooden target six by six feet will be used. The distance will be fifty feet from a throwing line. In the catcher's throw for accuracy an empty barrel will be placed at second base with the opening facing the home plate. For this contest, points will be given for ability to throw the ball directly into the barrel, or to bounce or roll the ball in. Throwing from second base home and from center field home will be tested for accuracy and distance.

Time will count in circling the bases. The contestant will start with one foot on the home plate, and at the signal will circle the bases, touching each one in turn.

There will also be a contest for hitting in which the contestant stands behind a restraining line, tosses the ball up in the air and hits it. This event will also be tested for distance and accuracy.

Prizes will be given for points in special events, and a special prize for the all-around baseball champion.

Opportunity for practice will be given at local schools before the community-wide tournament. The tournament has been planned to prelude the official opening of the baseball season for the grammar school league and community teams now being organized.
