PUBLIC UTILITIES REGULATION PROBLEM

Discussion in April Number of Illinois Voter, Organ of Woman's League

The April number of the Illinois Voter, monthly publication of the Illinois League of Women Voters, carries a leading article on "The Regulation of Public Utilities" by Joseph C. Swidler, who says in part:

"Originally the only control the public had over utilities was through the courts. If a utility company charged Mr. Jones an unreasonable price for some product or service, he might go to court to recover the excess. Or if the utility refused to give Mr. Jones adequate service, he might go to court to compel the rendition of the service. But the courts had no power to fix rates for the future, or to fix them for the public as a whole; they could only say that an individual was charged too much or too little, or had had some injustice done him."

"The next step was taken when the state legislatures themselves, rather than the courts, began to regulate the rates, and to a very slight extent the services, of public utility companies. This was also very unsatisfactory. The legislatures had to attend to a great press of business, and had no time to draw up separate rate schedules for each company."

Commission System

"Toward the close of the last century a device was originated to cure these defects, and to assure quick and inexpensive justice to both utility companies and to consumers. This device was regulation through expert commissions. The commissions have different names. Here in Illinois we have the Illinois Commerce Commission and Illinois is one of the states which has granted its commission full and sweeping powers over all important types of utilities."

"Why are public utilities treated differently than other types of companies? Because the types of businesses are ones upon which the public is so dependent that these businesses cannot be left in the sphere of unregulated private competition and furthermore competition is often impracticable because they are natural monopolies. The law regards these businesses as affected with a public interest, and therefore a public business, over which the government can exercise much greater control than it can over businesses not affected with a public interest."

"The commission system of regulating utilities has granted to the public great powers, but to use these powers effectively, it must have alert and informed leaders among the thoughtful men and women of the state."
