**Measure to Codify All Laws Affecting Veterans Being Put Into Effect**

Codification of all veterans' legislation, provided in a resolution passed by the United States Senate on January 12, probably will be completed this summer, according to word from Frank T. Hines, administrator of Veterans' Affairs, who said it would be sometime before the vast amount of material could be compiled and made ready for publication.

According to C. W. Motter, of Lincoln, Neb., chairman of the League's national publicity committee, the adoption of this resolution was sponsored by the Legion post of McCook, Neb. It was introduced in the Senate by Senator Norris of Nebraska. The text of the resolution is as follows:

"Resolved, that the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs is requested to

prepare and transmit to the senate, in form suitable to be printed, a codification of all federal laws relating to the veterans of our various wars, which codification shall contain (1) appropriate explanatory notes and annotations to each section of such codification, and (2) suitable headings, reference tables, and indices, for the purpose of making available a clear and complete statement of all the rights and privileges of such veterans."

**Choral Selections to Be Feature North Shore Festival May 18 to 23**

The choral works which will be offered during this year's North Shore Music festival in Patten gymnasium during the week of May 18 to 23 are somewhat more modern than have been done prior to this year. The chief compositions will be Roussel's

80th Psalm and Honegger's "King David."

Roussel's psalm is a masterpiece of recent French music. Henry Pruniere's, one of the world's greatest critics said of the 80th Psalm, "It is a great human work, poignant in feeling. It speaks for men who suffer and who implore the Heavens to save them, with cries of revolt which in the end subside in a transport of confidence and hope." This work is being introduced for the first time to festival audiences.

"Le Roi David" of "King David" composed by Arthur Honegger is of world-wide fame. Written in 1921 and produced three years later, the dramatic power of this symphonic psalm at once arrested the attention of music lovers and it quickly reached great popularity in America as well as on the continent.

Additional works to be sung during the North Shore Festival will be the finale to Wagner's "Die Meistersing-

er," the highly colored march and chorus from Goldmark's "Queen of Sheba." The Polovetsian dances and chorus from Borodin's "Prince Igor" will also be presented.

Selections from four of the Gilbert & Sullivan operas will be sung by the children's chorus of 1500. These numbers include selections from "Patience," "The Mikado," "Pinafore" and the "Pirates of Penzance."

**Deerfield P. T. A. to Hold Meeting Friday**
