the city of Highland Park would be over \$2,000. The attorney for the city also argued that since the annexation comprehensive zoning ordinances had been enacted and a city plan had been drawn up by experts, all covering this property.

The property owner was represented by Attorney Okel S. Fuqua of Waukegan. He argued that the annexation proceedings of 1925 were invalid because of insufficient signatures to the petition for annexation, also that the Deerfield disannexation ordinance could not be found and that there was no petition filed with the clerk of the village of Deerfield.

During the hearing, Corporation Counsel Munro filed an affidavit setting up the claims of the city against the allowance of the petition. Judge Dady indicated to the attorneys that he would rule in favor of the city but gave Attorney Fuqua an additional week to examine the city's affidavits.

The matter comes up for final disposition next Saturday morning.

Surviving are the widow and three sons and four daughters. The children are Martin, Herman and Edward Hart, Mrs. Raymond Sneed, Mrs. Ben Helke, Mrs. Nicholas Miller, Mrs. Sam Bernardi. There are 10 grandchildren.

Mr. Hart was a member of the Highland Park lodge of Elks and of the Knights of Columbus Council.

The funeral service was held Monday, April 13, at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, at 9 a.m. and burial was in St. Mary's cemetery.

The city council at its last session adopted the following resolution regarding Mr. Hart's death:

"Whereas, in the wisdom of Divine Providence there has been removed from our midst a former city official and honored citizen of Highland Park John Hart, whose death occurred Saturday, April 11, 1931, after a lifetime largely spent in the service of his fellow citizens and in the interests of his home city, whom he served faithfully for almost thirty years.

"Therefore, be it resolved that the City Council of Highland Park, in behalf of the citizens of our city and in recognition of the sterling worth and many years of efficient service of the decedent in the interests of Highland Park and its people, hereby extends to the bereaved relatives the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community,

"Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of this meeting of the City Council and that a copy be furnished the family of the late John Hart."
