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or cut it off to expose the soil on top of the ball.

Next, fill the hole within 3 or 4 inches of the top with good earth, firming it with a stick or with the feet. Then pour in enough water to settle the soil firmly. Allow this water to completely settle away before putting in any more soil. Enough loose soil should be added later to bring the soil to the desired level, but it is best to leave a depression around the tree to catch water.

Subsequent watering may be needed especially with trees planted around the foundation where rain may not reach them. Always water thoroughly, giving a good soaking at weekly intervals. Cultivation of the soil will assist in growth and conserve the moisture.
