Deerfield Supervisor Chosen As Chairman by Supervisors This Morning

William J. Obee, supervisor for Deerfield township for many years, and re-elected in the township election April 7, was elected chairman of the county board of supervisors at the organization meeting of the board, held this morning in Waukegan.

Mr. Obee, whose long service to the township as its chief representative on the board of supervisors, has again and again been returned to office and has given his time and effort unreservedly in the interests of his constituents and for the welfare of the county at large. No member of the county board is more familiar with the machinery of country government and none better fitted to head the county board, because of his long service and wide experience in these matters.

Last year Mr. Obee was mentioned prominently for chairman of the board, but relinquished his claims for the time being, and this year it was the general sentiment of the board that no member was more entitled to its consideration as chairman than the Deerfield supervisor, and his election was made unanimous.

Mr. Obee's many friends in Highland Park will be glad to learn that his long and faithful services have been given merited recognition by his colleagues on the county board, and hearty congratulations are being extended him on his election as chairman. Being elected chairman automatically makes him chairman of the board of review for the coming year.

Council Increases Pay Mayor, Commissioners For Coming Fiscal Year

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening the salary ordinance for city officials for the ensuing year was passed. The salary of the mayor was increased from \$600 to \$1,200, and the salary of each commissioner from \$400 to \$900.

This action is in accordance with the law governing the commission form of government, which provides for increases in salaries for these officials according to growth in population. The increases voted Monday night are based on the 1930 census report for Highland Park. It is pointed out that the new salaries take effect at the beginning of the fiscal year and must be made by the retiring council, as the new officials, under the law, may not boost their own salaries after assuming office.
