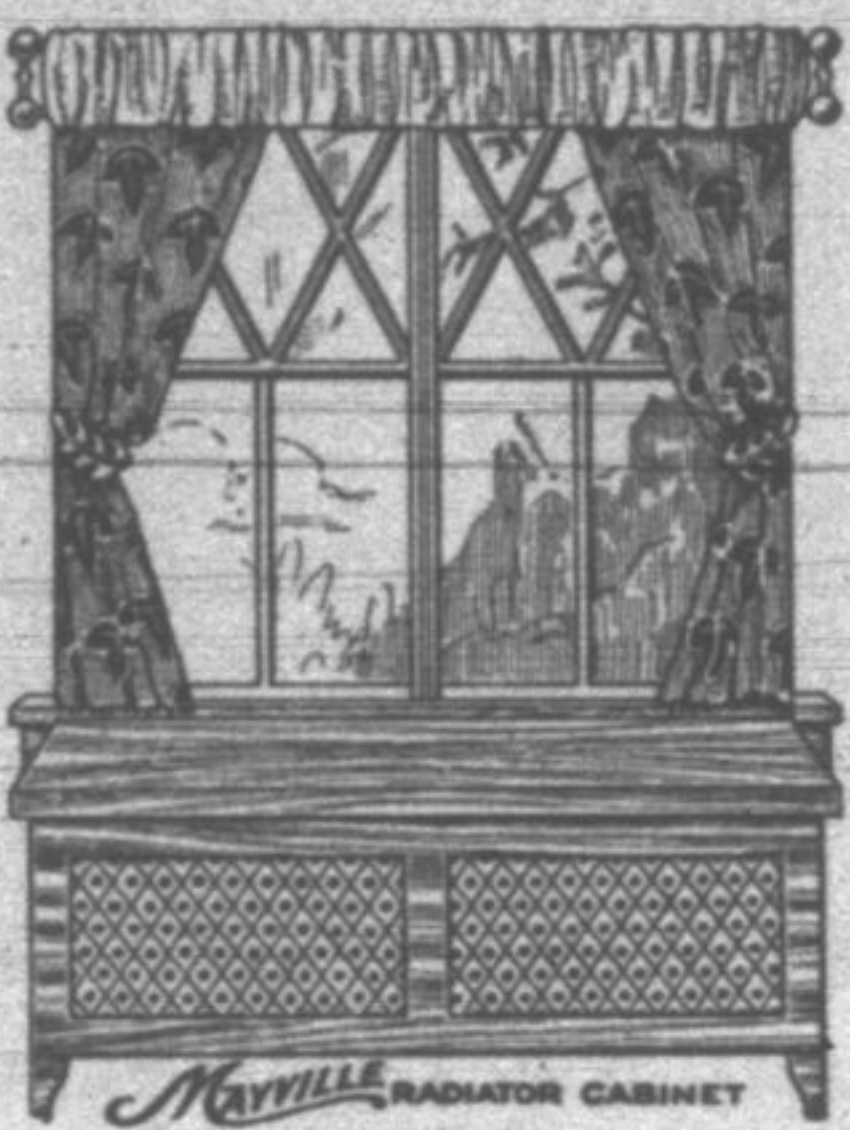
sent, did not reach the meeting in time to be read.

The corresponding secretary's report was read in Mrs. Tyson's absence. For each of the six meetings of the league, 235 announcements have been sent out and 37 board members telephoned. Letters have been written to legislators urging the passage of league measures.

Mrs. Kornblith, civic chairman, reported on the candidates' meetings, and the compiling of candidates' records.

Legal Status of Women

Mrs. Simons, chairman of legal status of women, organized Lake



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county for the women-on-juries campaign, and held weekly meetings. She attended the state convention as well as many committee meetings, and assisted in two local league programs. She mentioned the Juror's Handbook issued by the league to familiarize women with jury service.

Mrs. Greenberg, chairman of education, reported state conferences attended and letters sent to legislators. The state league has asked Mrs. Greenberg to speak on several occasions, and in March, she delivered a radio address on the larger school unit.

Dr. Lauer, chairman of social hygiene, has attended a number of interesting lectures, and state meetings under the direction of Dr. Rachelle Yarros, and has conducted a Highland Park study group in social hygiene.

Mrs. Sellery, chairman of living costs, whose report was read in her absence, mentioned conferences attended in Chicago.

Mrs. Davis, luncheon chairman, gave the number of luncheons served during the year.

Child Welfare

Mrs. Walker as child welfare chairman, attended the state convention in November, and other conferences. She mentioned the results of the White House conference, and of the Illinois child welfare commission which has evolved a children's code embodied in some 30 bills introduced by Senator Florence Bohrer. The federal league-measure, bill 255 (which is a continuance of the Sheppard-Towner act) was passed by the Senate and amended by the House.

Mrs. Simons who is qualified to serve as auditor, and who kindly offered her services to the league, presented the auditor's report. She also read the treasurer's report in the absence of Mrs. Glidden.

Mrs. Sherer, publicity chairman, reported 942 inches of publicity, or 84 articles and two editorials secured by the league since last April.

Mrs. Hopkins, president, spoke of the growth of the league, and of its service to the voters of the community, with its two candidates' meetings, election notices and ballot-marking information.

Mrs. Hopkins attended the state convention, and spoke of prizes awarded at that time to the Highland Park League for outstanding work. She referred briefly to the various benefits given by the league during the year, with special appreciation of the untiring work of the committee in charge. The white elephant sale was so successful, it has been suggested that it be made a feature of next year's meetings.

New Committee

Mrs. Hopkins announced a new committee in charge of Mrs. Balke for the study of Lake County government and institutions, with the purpose of co-operation in the betterment of conditions. During the last month, a number of Highland Park League members have visited at various times the county jail, poor farm, hospital, juvenile court and detention home.

Mrs. Davis was complimented on the excellence of the luncheons served during the year.

Mrs. Hopkins, in closing, urged the continued interest and effort of the Highland Park members in carrying on this political education, and requested each woman present to secure at least one new member for the league.
