HOW TO SELECT SHADE TREES

FOR SMALL HOME GROUNDS Very often it is a real problem to know which trees are suitable for planting on the small lot. An open sunny space is desirable, but if large trees are planted they are likely to shade this area throughout the day. The answer, then, is to plant trees which are more in keeping with the proportions of the small garden.

A beech tree is a magnificent specimen but it grows to such great size and its low, spreading branches make it difficult to grow anything near it, so it would be suitable only on large grounds.

Although the elm is likewise a tall grower it has no low spreading branches, and it adapts itself more readily to combination plantings. Its habit of growth is such, too, that its shadow moves in a wide area during the course of the day and no one part of the garden is so completely sheltered from the sun that it is unsuitable for growing other plants.

In all tree plantings, regardless of the size of the lot, certain factors are to be considered, and on the small lot these are especially important. Before planting a tree take into consideration its size, shade and root area when fully developed. Plan to have the shade on walks and drives rather combination.
