### Au Plain Cemetery To Be Preserved

The question of the preservation of Au Plains cemetery at the corner of Dundee and Saunders roads was brought up at the Illinois Evangelical conference at Barrington last week.

The matter was referred to the conference trustees with power to act. The conference recommended that the cemetery be surveyed and fenced and be in readiness for the one hundredth anniversary of the organization of the church. This will give three years' time to get the settlement adjusted.
