

Change in Time Alters N. S. Line's Schedule

Operation of trains on daylight saving time and rearrangement of service to increase facilities for the riding public are features of the new schedule of the North Shore Line, which went into effect Sunday, April 26, it is announced by R. S. Amis, general passenger agent.

Residents of Shore Line communities from Waukegan south to Chicago were afforded increased convenience southbound during the morning rush period under the new schedule. Limited trains leaving downtown Waukegan at 6:25 a.m., 6:55 a.m., 7:25 a.m., and 7:55 a.m., eliminate some stops formerly made north of Highwood, speeding up this morning service to the Chicago loop.

For the benefit of commuters formerly boarding these trains at local stops, four local trains southbound leave North Chicago Junction at 6:20 a.m., 6:55 a.m., 7:17 a.m., and 7:45 a.m., making all stops to the Chi-

cago loop. The point of departure for these locals under the old schedule of operation was Highwood. The Highwood-Chicago specials have been rearranged to speed up this service during the morning, trains being scheduled to leave Highwood southbound at 7:45 and 8:15 a.m., under the new operating plan.

Sergeant at Fort Is Found Dead; Suicide Is Officers' Theory

Sergeant Edward J. McNally, veteran army sergeant who was found dead on the rifle range at Fort Sheridan Saturday morning with a bullet in his head, left all his possessions to his three brothers in Chicago, a letter subsequently found by army authorities disclosed.

Sergeant McNally, who served in all major engagements in the world war and had an honorable record of twenty years in the service, borrowed a rifle from another member of the Second Infantry and went out

on the rifle range at 7 o'clock Saturday morning. He was found at 8:15 by two other men from the same company. Army officials said they believed the man was a suicide. His brothers think death was accidental.

The deceased is survived by three brothers, Thomas, Anthony, and Frank, all of Chicago. He was buried in Mt. Carmel cemetery, Chicago with full military funeral.

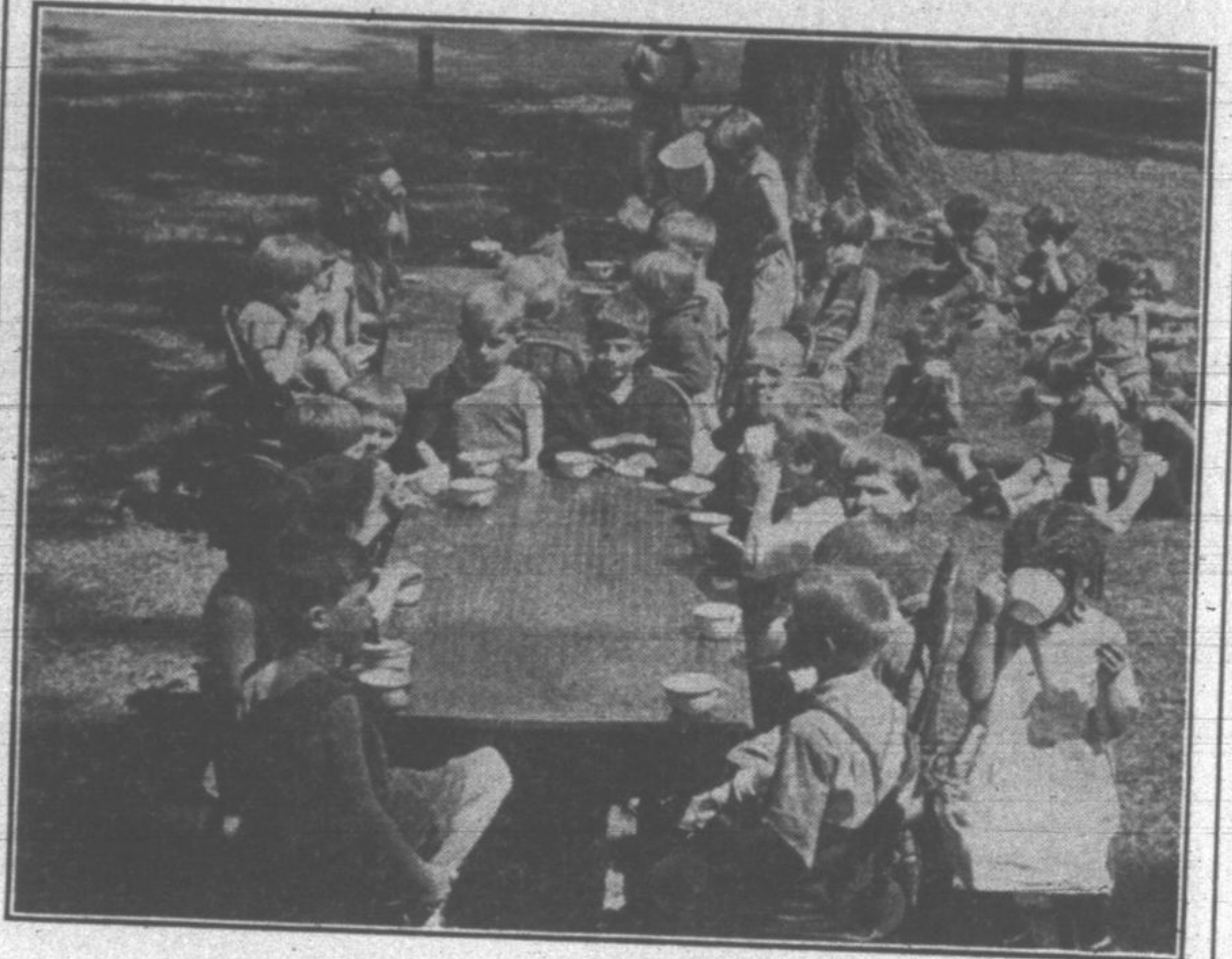
Mrs. Harriet Hoover, 87, a Lake county pioneer, died at her farm home three miles north of Wauconda last week. She had been ill for some time.
