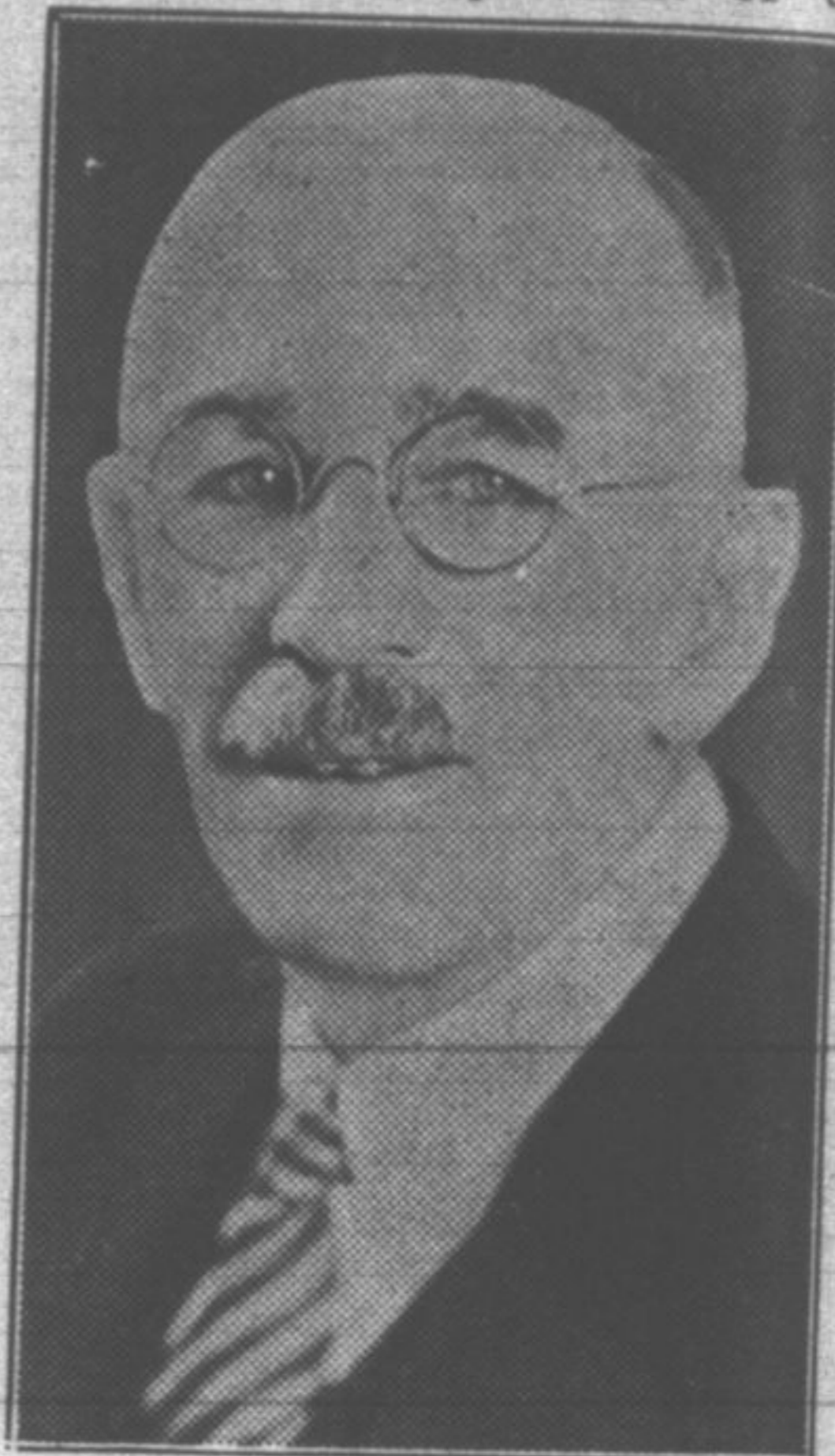
Mother-Daughter Party on Friday
