

## GARDEN FAIR TO BE HELD ON SATURDAY

From 9 a. m. to 6 p. m., Ravinia Station Park; Parade to Start at 9:30

## Jesse L. Smith to Lead Bird Study Field Trip Tuesday Morn, May 6th

Mr. Jesse L. Smith, well known field naturalist and principal of the Elm Place school, will lead the special field trip for the study of birds at 6 a. m. Tuesday morning, May 12. Mr. Smith is to be assisted on this trip by other well known bird students, and particular attention will be given to warblers.

These trips inaugurated early in March, have proved very popular. The bird calendar, prepared by the Elm Place school, has been followed, and other very helpful materials have been made available at the Public library.

During the last two weeks the following birds have been observed: Vesper Sparrow, Swamp Sparrow, Field Sparrow, Towhee or Shewink, White-throated Sparrow, Myrtle Warbler, Purple Martin, Barn Sparrow, House Wren, Catbird, Red-headed Woodpecker, Baltimore Oriole, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Red-eyed Vireo, Black and White Creeper, Wood Thrush, Brown Creeper, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Brown Thrasher, Purple Finch, Blue Bird, Cow Bird, Harry Woodpecker, Starling Cooper's Hawk, Junco, and Kildeer.

The warblers, now due according to bird calendars, include: Kate May Warbler, Black-throated Blue Warbler, Black-throated Green Warbler, Yellow Warbler, Magnolia, and Chestnut-sided Warbler.

All interested in birds are invited to attend and become members of this field club. Notebooks, pencils, and field glasses will be found very useful. He leaves his wife and two children, Mrs. Arch Abercromby of Highland Park and Sewald Rebling of Deerfield, and two grandchildren, Helen Jean and Bernice Abercromby.

## Lest We Forget

Work of preparing for the annual poppy sale of the American Legion Auxiliary in Highwood went into full swing today when the memorial poppies which will be worn on Poppy Day, May 22 and 23, in honor of the World War dead were received at Legion and Auxiliary headquarters there. The little red flowers, packed in neat boxes, are made by disabled veterans under Legion direction. Each poppy has been made individually by some disabled veteran who through this work has been able to help himself or his family in the long struggle against the handicaps of war disability. Often there is a tragic and pathetic story wrapped up in these flowers.
