A Chicago premiere, a revival of an opera not heard in this part of the country since the Chicago Opera season of 1918-19 and an American premiere are promised in the statement, released by Louis Eckstein for publication today, of plans for the twentieth season of Ravinia grand opera and concerts, which opens on Saturday night, June 20 and continues through Monday night, August 31.
