"Body and Soul" Charles Farrell as a young American officer in a story treating of the war-time theory "Live for today." Adults.

"Divorce among friends" a rather inane film, nothing particularly objectionable but has little value for intelligent audiences.

SPLENDID PROGRAM IS RAVINIA PROMISE

Summer Opera Season Opens on
June 20, Ends Aug. 31; List
of Artists, Etc.

A Chicago premiere, a revival of an opera not heard in this part of the country since the Chicago Opera season of 1918-19 and an American premiere are promised in the statement, released by Louis Eckstein for publication today, of plans for the twentieth season of Ravinia grand opera and concerts, which opens on Saturday night, June 20 and continues through Monday night, August 31. These operatic novelties are, respectively, "Peter Ibbetson," to be sung in English, "William Tell" and "La Basoche."

Few diversions are more costly than the production of grand opera and, considering the parlous state of matters financial, Ravinia might easily have been pardoned had it elected to rest for the time on laurels of previous productions which would require only the usual brushing-up to restore their pristine luster. However, the mere fact that it is presented in the summer time when most of the world makes holiday detracts no whit from what Ravinia considers the obligation of a major opera house, which is to march steadily forward in pursuit of that elusively lovely ideal, the perfect artistic achievement.

Great Talent of World

So it is with the genuine relief of reassurance that we again find the Ravinia roster concentrating the great talent of the world, for not only are all the favorites to return, but a new tenor and a new baritone have been engaged to swell the volume of stagewise song.

Lucrezia Bori, the volatile Spaniard who is so lovely of person that her flashing soprano seems an extra gift of the gods, arrives to give newly seductive charm to the Manons, the Mimis, the Fioras and all the other frail ladies who drift through the tuneful romance of opera, singing with insouciant ease in Italian, French and her native Spanish. This season Miss Bori will add unaccustomed English to her linguistic repertoire when she sings for us the dreamy Mary, Duchess of Towers, which role she created at the Metropolitan earlier in the season at the world premiere of "Peter Ibbetson."

Rethberg Returning

Elisabeth Rethberg comes back to bestow the gleam of her Saxon beauty and the superb symmetry of her great soprano upon the versatile repertoire to which the open-seasame is found only by a voice at once re-
