
Eagle Scout Draws Map of Camp

Trading Post Is Store and Bank for Campers

The first day in camp, Scouts deposit all their money in the camp bank which is run in connection with the Trading Post. Thereafter, in camp credit, not money, is used. Checks are made out by the boy and presented for payment in all cases.

In the Trading Post only ten cents a day may be spent for candy or "sweets." The post will be well stocked with Scout uniforms, camp equipment and various other supplies to be for sale to Scouts and officers. The Trading Post is the camp store and bank.

Campers Have Roomy, Comfortable Quarters

The living quarters of the Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan camper is a roomy, 10x12 heavy duck tent to accommodate four Scouts. It is equipped with two double-deck cots and with a camp equipment box for each camper. The steel cots have a spring, canvas bed, affording a comfortable home for the Scouts.

Wooden floors safeguard against dampness and make for neat appearing quarters. With tent sides rolled there is good cross circulation affording plenty of fresh air for all. Not more than four Scouts will be assigned to one tent. Daily inspection of tents and equipment keeps everything "ship-shape."-
