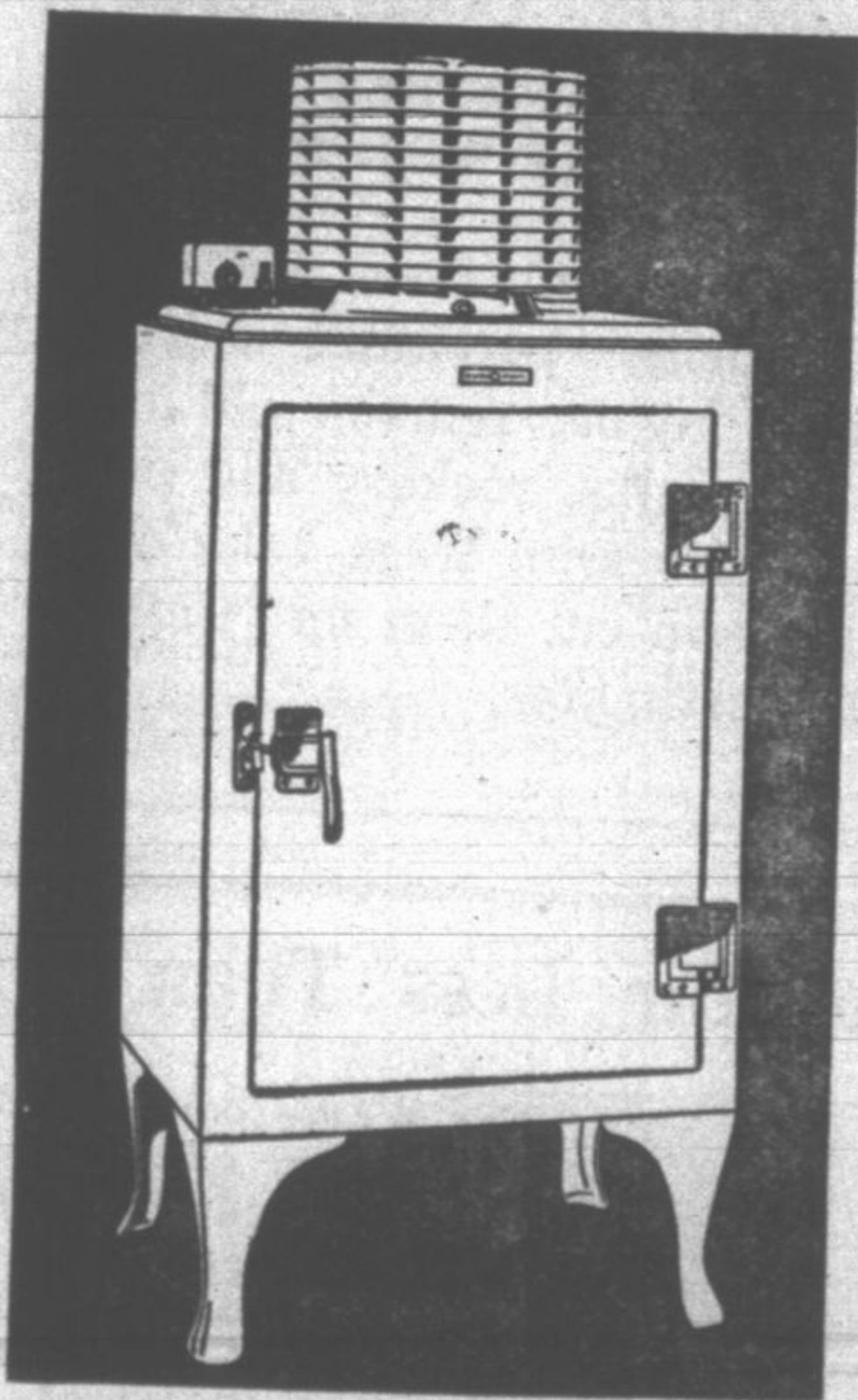
Mrs. Smith charges her husband with cruelty.
