

LORD HAMPTON LAUDS SCOUT PROGRAM HERE

Says Mothers Day Observance at Ravinia Park Fine Show; Other Comments

Lord Hampton, Chief Scout Commissioner of Great Britain, acclaimed the "Youths tribute to mothers" program held Mother's day, May 10 at Ravinia Opera park as a "Jolly fine show." He further stated, "When I return to England I will be sure to tell them about it—this will interest them. I want to congratulate the scouts of the north shore—yes, a jolly good show." The attendance of over 4000 would have surpassed the previously announced estimate of 6000 had it not been for the threatening weather.

This program was sponsored by the North Shore Area council of which Mr. Myron C. Rybolt is scout executive. Nearly 2,000 Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts, Cubs, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls and Girl Reserves participated in a colorful parade and review before the grand stand, filled to capacity with mothers, fathers and friends.

Fowler Is Chairman

Mr. Fowler, president of the North Shore Area council, was chairman of the program. Lord Hampton and Bernard L. McNulty, president of Chicago Council of Campfire Girls each presented a three minute address as a tribute to the mothers. The peak of the program was the presentation of the Life Saving Honor medal by the chief Scout Executive, James E. West of New York to the mother of Scout John H. Brumbaugh Jr., Troop 3, Wilmette. The boy lost his life saving the life of a fellow scout.

Lake Forest Academy Building Fire Damaged Last Sunday Afternoon

Fire believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion or defective wiring on Sunday raged for three hours in Reid hall, Lake Forest academy. The fire was put out by firemen before it spread greatly. Damage was estimated at from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

Fire loss was confined to the basement, which was badly charred. Smoke and heat reached the first floor and blistered varnish and paint, damaging some of the furniture in the office of Headmaster John Wayne Richards. Many cherished paintings, depicting the history of the academy since its founding in 1857, were damaged by smoke but most of them can probably be restored. Classes are being continued in the gymnasium and study halls, and repairs to the damaged building will be started immediately.

"Peter Ibbetson," "William Tell" and "La Basoche;" Brief Outline; Artists

Looking forward to the twentieth season of Ravinia opera and concerts, announced last week to begin on Saturday night, June 20 and continue through Monday night, August 31, it is particularly interesting to look with some detail into the histories of the three novelties, "Peter Ibbetson," "William Tell" and "La Basoche," which have been promised to give the sparkle of novelty to the summer.
