### Decide to Conduct Services in English

Highwood M. E. Church has always been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. When the work was begun at the present location, a little more than 27 years ago, the Swedish language was used exclusively. Gradually, however, it has been found necessary to increasingly modify the Swedish program with an English one. The climax of these efforts toward adaptation was undoubtedly reached at the Quarterly conference last Sunday when it was unanimously decided that the church be known by the above name and that after May 17 all services be held in the English language.

This new move on the part of the church is indicative of two things very much in keeping with the Christian spirit: it is evangelical in that it serves the greatest number; it is Christ minded because it places religion above language and nationalism.
