### Voliva Starts Damage Suits Against Several Zion Residents; Details

Wilbur Glenn Voliva recently started suits for \$170,000 in circuit court through Attorney J. A. Miller against the leaders in the attempt to place him in bankruptcy in the Chicago federal court.

Peter B. Johnson, president of the Zion Chamber of Commerce, and his wife are made defendants in the suit for \$100,000; Charles A. Piper and his wife and Isaac E. Mills, \$25,000 each; Mary E. Mills and Frank Dietz and his wife are defendants in \$10,000 claims. Action will also be taken against others who were instrumental in bringing about the bankruptcy proceedings against Voliva, Attorney Miller intimated.

The validity of the will is being upheld by Castle, Williams, Long & McCarthy, of Chicago, and Edwards & Block, while the contest was filed by Wetten, Pegler & Dale.

Approximately \$15,000 is involved in the suit.

### State Commission in Favor of Cigaret Tax

The state legislative revenue commission last week approved a tax of 2-cents per package on cigarettes of all types, and of 10 per cent on cigars and other forms of tobacco. The

tax bill, which is expected to be ready for presentation to the house sometime next week, would provide the state with almost \$20,000,000 a year additional revenue. The new bill is one of the means being proposed for preventing deficits in the state treasury.
