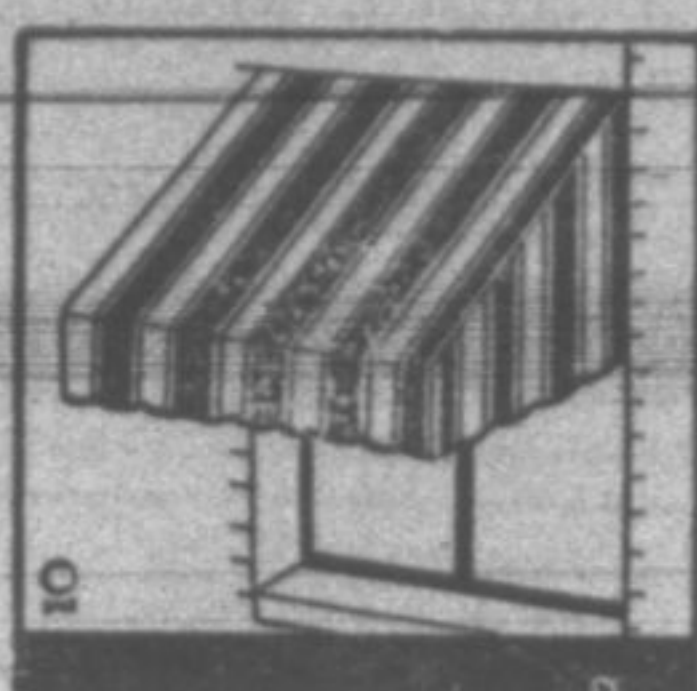

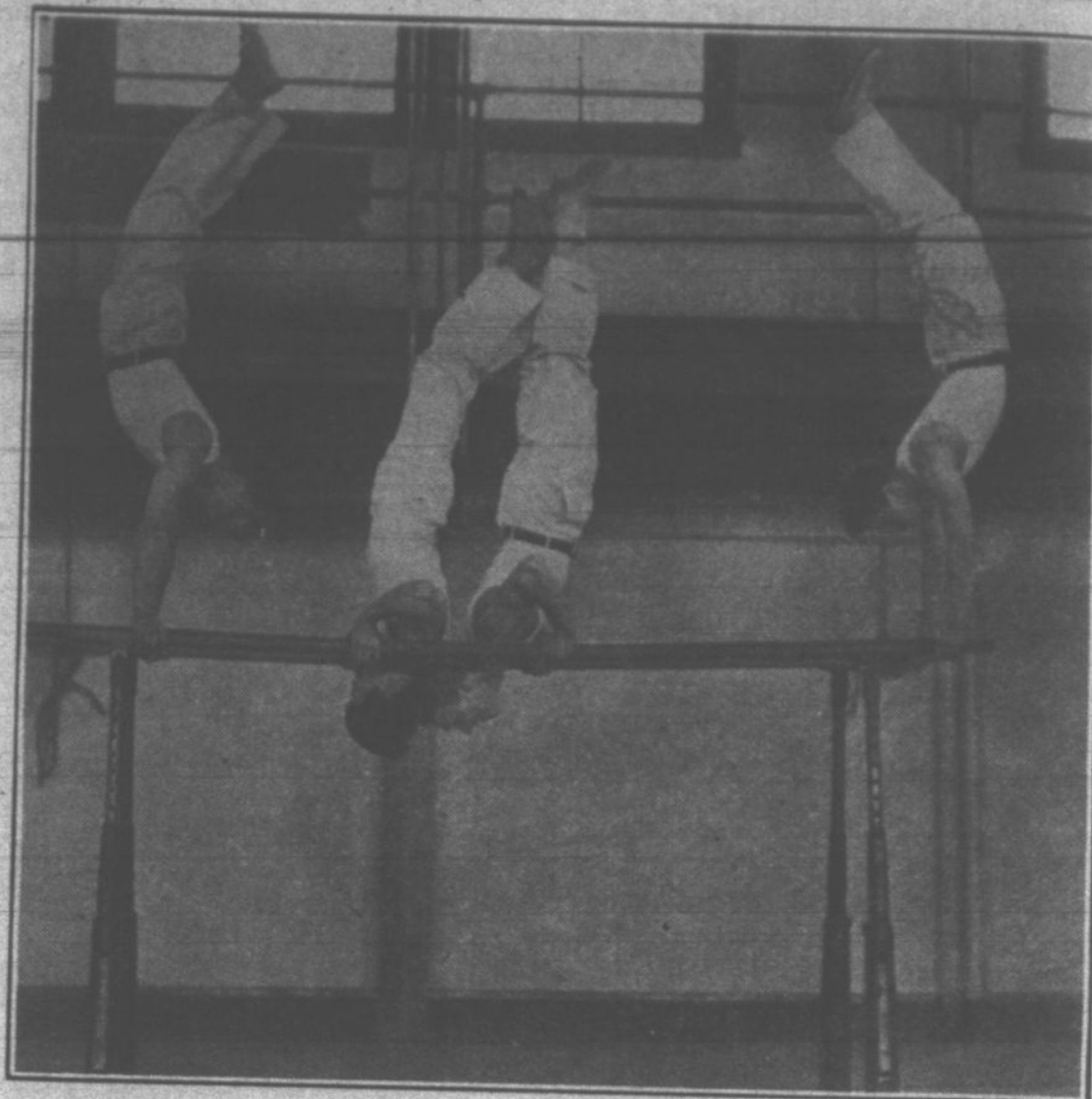

Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Carr left on Sunday for Excelsior Springs.

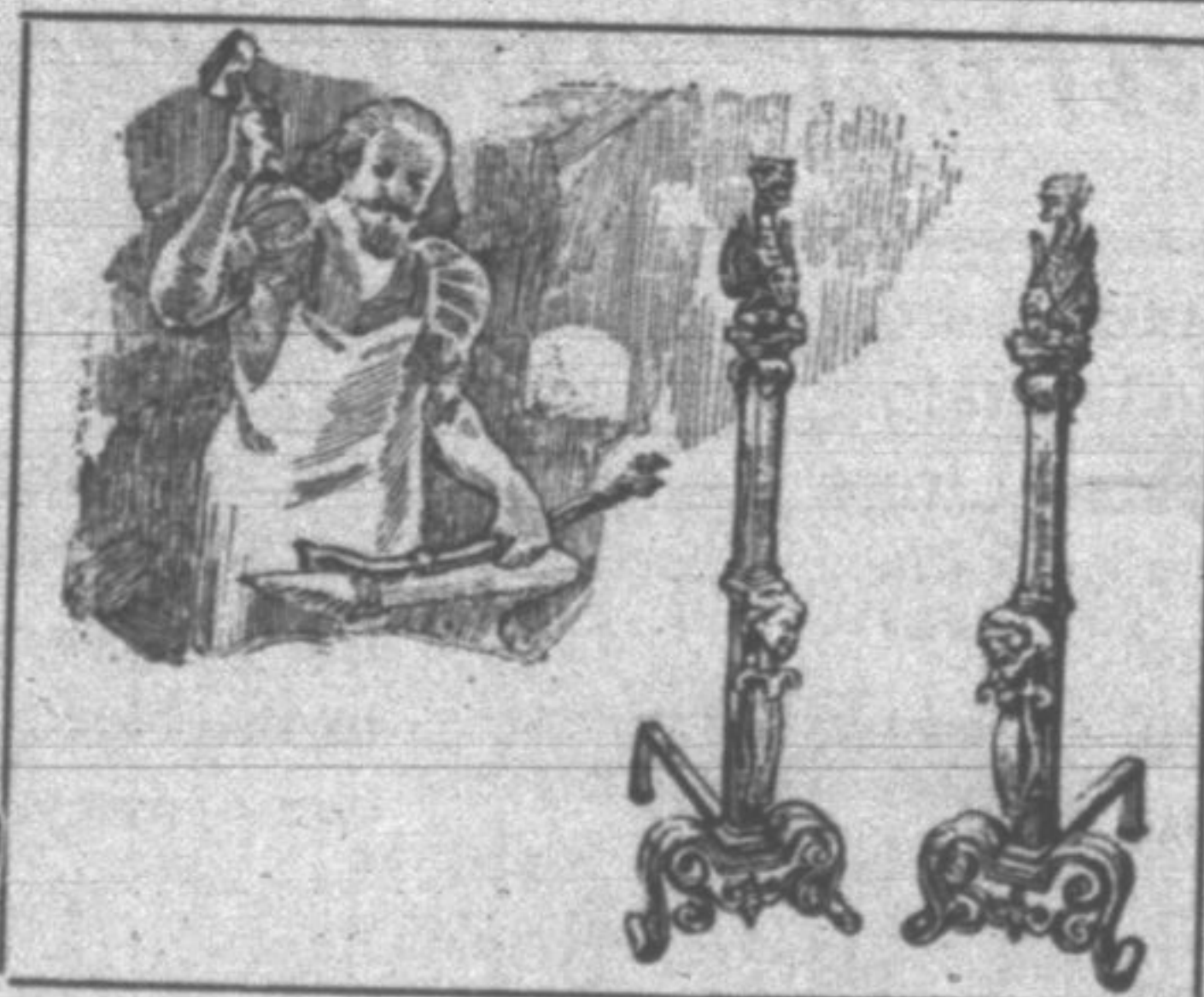
