In making this record the major reached a height of 45,000 feet. There he lost consciousness, and his plane fell 36,000 feet before he regained his senses. His eyeballs were frozen and he had great difficulty in handling the controls. Finally he managed to level the plane off at 1,500 feet and made a safe landing.
