

### LITTLE BUSINESS AT MEETING OF COUNCIL

The mayor and Corporation Council Gail are to investigate the matter.

### Highland Park Man Is Prominent Figure in Radio Tube Decision

Oswald F. Schuette of Highland Park, executive secretary of the Radio Protective Association of America, according to New York and Chicago newspapers, has been largely instrumental in the recent sweeping decision of the United States Supreme court, reversing a ruling of the Third Circuit Court of Appeals and holding the Langmuir radio tube patent to be invalid.

The effect of the decision, which was handed down in the case of the De Forest Radio company against the General Electric company, which controls the Langmuir patent, was that the Langmuir patent was not infringed by the De Forest concern. The De Forest suit has contended that unless the patent was set aside, General Electric would have a virtual monopoly of the radio tube in common use.

Mr. Schuette, whose home is at 1001 Sheridan road, north, is of the opinion that this decision is "another smashing victory over the radio trust," and that the independents should not only recover royalties already paid but should be able to recover triple damages "for all the injuries" they have received.
