Planting Completed at Rose Garden

Planting at the Municipal Rose Garden is finished for this spring. The Hugonis hedge has been put in along Roger Williams avenue, and will be a mass of yellow bloom next spring. Many rugosa roses and their hybrids have been put in. A few of the old-time roses are in, such as York and Lancaster, which romance connects with the war of the roses. Some of the native wild roses have been planted, as well as such species as the Sweetbriar of England, while thorns, wild plums and wild crabs have been put in to form screens on the two sides of the garden. These small trees are all members of the Rose family, so that they will form an appropriate background. The Michigan Rose has been planted all along the wire fence next to the railroad, so that passengers on the trains going by, will see a screen of pink bloom—next July, if not this.

These plants, (approximately 450,) plus the necessary black soil and manure, represent the outlay of the money taken in at the Garden Fair. There is still plenty of unplanted ground in the beds, and the informal pool which will be the focal point for the garden is still to go in. This will all be accomplished in due time, say members of the Ravinia Garden club.

In the meantime passers-by have noticed the park board men hard at work, cultivating, watering, fixing up the grass paths and in every way keeping up the good work. Many of the roses have died back because of the late planting, but new shoots will soon show on most of them.

The Ravinia Garden club is going into the Rose Garden competition, inaugurated by the Woman's Home Companion, and sponsored by the American Rose society, with a great deal of confidence. The prize of \$1,000 is being offered for progress, and the club feels that they have so much room for progress, that their chances of winning are good.

The following committee has been appointed to take care of the work in connection with the competition: Mrs. E. H. Klaber, chairman; Mrs. J. C. Ewell, Mrs. M. J. Hardacre, Mrs. R. McKnight, Mrs. E. E. Leonard.

Mrs. Hardacre has charge of taking the photographs which must be sent in 3 times during the season of 1931, and 3 times during the season of 1932. The competition closes Dec. 31, 1932.

Mrs. McKnight will take care of the weekly reports which must include condition and care of roses, and all facts connected with them, and an approximate attendance record. Mrs. Leonard is treasurer of the Rose Garden fund.

All varieties are to be clearly and permanently labelled, so that the garden will form an educational feature, as well as beautiful one.

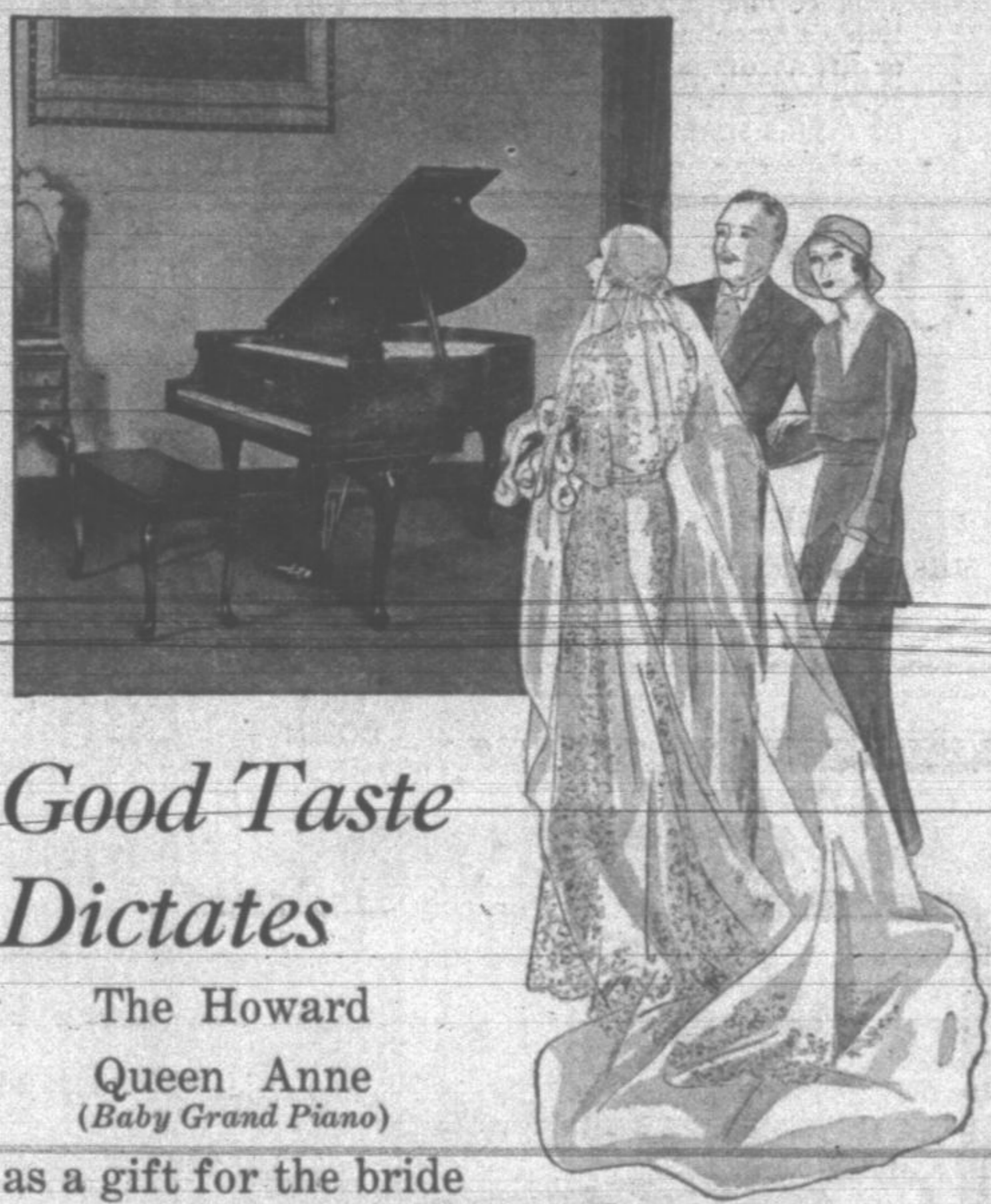


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
