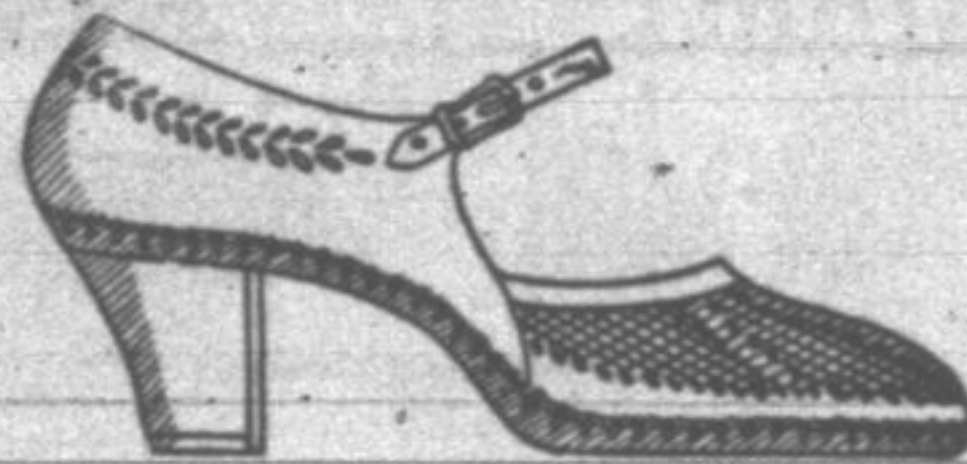
Mrs. Milton Tillman of Central avenue entertained at luncheon yesterday (Wednesday). Covers were laid for twelve.
