The old fashioned all day sucker still is America's most popular candy, according to reports today of 300 manufacturers at the 48th annual National Confectioners' association convention.

Meeting the sucker demand is one of the chief concerns of the candy industry, E. E. Cahoon, manufacturer, said. Machines have now been invented that turn out 400 suckers a minute, 192,000 a day, and 1,152,000 suckers a week.
